### II. A-Brief Description Of What The Measure Does That Has Fiscal Impact

Thisbillwouldexpandthepoolofavailabledentalprovidersabletoadministerpreventivesealantdentalservicesto children. Service provision would be limited to school-based, school-linked programs of preventive dental care by registered dental hygenists (RDHs) who completes pecific training. Training and endorsement would occur under the Washington State Sealant Program administered by the Department of Health.

Forlow-income,rural,andotherat-riskpopulationsadentalhygienistmayassessforandapplysealantsandfluoride varnishesincommunity-basedsealantprogramsinschools,whetherornotthehygienisthasattendedDOH'ssealant endorsementprogram. Also, adentalassistant, working under the supervision of alicenseddentist, may apply the sealantsandfluoride varnishesintheschool-basedsealant programs.

The bill requires the DOH to establish the endorsement program, and DOH may collect fees for implementation of this program. The Secretary of DOH is directed to report to the legislature by December 1,2005 on the outcome of this program.

The Medical Assistance Administration currently covers school-based seal ants of fered by registered dental hygien is the under the oversight of the Department of Health's (DOH) Maternal and Child Oral Health program. The DOH contracts with 19 Local Health Juris dictions (LHJs) for the provision of school based seal ant sand of tenthrough Local Health Juris diction sub-contracts with a dentistand are gistered dental hygien is through a Federal Qualified Health Center (FQHC) or Community Health Center (CHC).

InSFY2000,MAAspent\$4,104,346onsealantsfor48,624childrenunderage18,mostofwhichwereprovidedthrough theschoolbasedsystem. The targeted schools for this service are those with high numbers of free and reduced lunch programs. The current barrier to the provision of services is the difficulty of locating adentist willing to provide the diagnosis currently required before the registered dental hygienist can provide the service in the school. Under this bill, the requirement for the dental diagnosis (for registered dental hygienists) is removed.

AregistereddentalhygienistinindependentpracticemayhavetoobtaincertificationthroughDOH,obtainliability insurance,provideassurancesthatsealantswillberetainedormakearrangementsforresealingteeth,andpurchase equipment(mobilechairs,lightingthat"sets"sealants). Itisunknownhowmanyregistereddentalhygienistswouldbe willingtoestablishanindependentpracticeasaresultofthisbill.

Initially, the remay be a small increase in the number of children eligible for Medicaid who receives eal ant sand fluoride varnish applications in school settings, as a result of this legislation. It is assumed that 1% more children would receive these services as a result of increased access, at a cost of \$123,000 total funds (\$61,000 GF-state) for the bien nium. In the ensuing bien nia, any additional costs for the SSB 6020 will result in off settings a vings through cost avoidance of restorative services.

Createsandrequiresanendorsementforlicenseddentalhygienists, as of the effective date of this act, to assess for and applyse a lant sand fluoride varnishes without an additional education requirement.

Italsoallowsanendorsementfordentalassistants, withoutadditionaleducation requirement, who have worked under dental supervision for at least two hundred hours to apply sealants and fluoride varnishes as of the effective date of this act.

These services will be provided in community based seal ant programs for low-income, rural, and other at-risk populations in coordination with local public health jurisdictions and local or alhealth coalitions.

Creates and requires an endorsement for Dental hygienists licensed and dental assistants working under the supervision of a dentist licensed after the effective date of this act, to provide the services mentioned above with an education requirement to be defined in rule. The Department of Health (DOH) must provide a report to the legislature by December 1,2005, evaluating the outcome of this act and they also may impose a feet othis act for implementation.

#### II.B-CashreceiptsImpact

Sections 1-5: Revenue will be generated, be ginning FY02, from fees collected to offset expenditures for these two new endorsements. This section allows DOH to charge a separate fee for an endorsement of alicensed dental hygienist and a separate fee for an endorsement of a dental assistant. Rules would be developed requesting fees that fully reimburse the cost for both of these new endorsements.

Sections 1-5: This bill provides a license endorsement for dental hygien is tsto access and applyse a lants and fluoride varnishes. Those license das of the effective date of this act can do this without any educational requirement. Health Professions Quality Assurance (HPQA) is estimating that a few hygien is tst hat we relicensed before the effective date may not requestendorsement immediately, but may do so at a later date, and will not need to meet the educational requirement. Those licensed after the effective date are required to complete some education to be defined by the DOH. HPQA has talked with a member of the Dental Hygiene Association and they are estimating that 1,500 hygien is ts will request the endorsement in FY02. Starting in FY03, HPQA is anticipating the 1,500 renewing, a long with an additional 100 applying for endorsement each and every year the reafter. By FY07, HPQA is estimating a total of 2,000 endorsements.

Currently, dental assistants are not regulated by DOH. This bill provides an endorsement for dental assistant stoaccess and apply seal ant sand fluoride varnishes. Those assistants that are working under the supervision of a dentist, as of the effective date of this act, can do this without any educational requirement. HPQA is estimating that a few assistants that we relicensed before the effective date may not requesten dorse mentimmediately, but may do so at a later date, and will not need to meet the educational requirement. Those licensed after the effective date are required to complete some education to be defined by the DOH. HPQA spoke with a member of the Dental Association and they are estimating that 75 assistants will request the endorsement in FY02. Starting in FY03, HPQA is anticipating the 75 renewing, a long with an additional 5 applying for endorsement each and every year the reafter. By FY07, HPQA is estimating a total of 100 endorsements.

Section 2: Requires the Secretary of DOH to provide a report to the legislature by December 1,2005, evaluating the outcome of this act. HPQA is anticipating that a question naire would likely be developed and mailed out to those who have obtained the endorsement. The information received backwould be analyzed and are portwritten. Costs for this function would only be in FY05 and would include staff time, printing and postage. FTEs would include .04 FTE Health Professions Manager 2 and .02 FTE Administrative Assistant 2.
