PartIV: Analysis A.SUMMARYOFBILL

Provide a clear, succinct decription of the bill with an emphasis on how it impacts local government.

This bill would mandate a 72 hour confinement in a facility for purposes of obtaining an evaluation by aperson or agency by the local regional support network, for juveniles (between the ages of 13-21) that committhe following offenses on school property: unlawful possession of a firearm, threat stobomb, and arson in the first and second degree.

This substitute bill changes the person required to conduct the evaluations from the county-designated mental health professional to the person or agency designated by the local regional support network. The bill also clarifies that:

-inadditiontoarsonandunlawfulpossessionoffirearmsonschoolgrounds,onlythreatstobombschools,notthreatstoinjureproperty, triggerthementalevaluations;andalsothatunlesstheminorwhowasarrestedwasrepresentedbycounselatthetimeoftheexamination,or wasarraignedpriortotheexamination,thennoreferenceintheexaminationreporttofactsorcircumstancesoftheallegedactswhich resultedinarrestshallbeadmissibleinanycriminalorjuvenileproceeding.

B.SUMMARYOFEXPENDITUREIMPACTS

Underthisbilltherewouldbeindeterminiateexpenditureimpactstolocalgovernments. Noadditional adjudication costs are expected as a result of the proposed requirement that the rebedetention hearings for minors arrested for bomb threats or arson 1 and 2, since the seminors are already currently held for detention. However, the provisions in the substitute bill requiring that the mental health evaluations for students be conducted by a person or agency designated by the RSN may incura dditional costs for counties. While RSN sare generally funded with state and federal monies, sufficient funding is not always available. In this case counties would be come responsible for costs (based on consultation with the Washington State Association of Counties).

Costs relating to evaluation of juveniles by county-design at edmental health professionals and chemical dependency professionals that may be referred by local regional support networks (RSNs) are discussed in the fiscal note from the Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS).

ASSUMPTIONS:

- -Lawenforcementcosts:noadditionallawenforcementcostswouldoccursincearrestsalreadyoccurforthespecifiedfelonies, and there is no significant change in required procedure (based on discussion with lawenforcement of ficers).
- -Number of hearings: 78 incidences would in curhear ingsrequiring court-appointed representation forminors (based DSHS data indicating an average of 251 percent of incidents involving bomb threats, and arson 1 or 2 occurring over the past 5 years, with an estimated 31.0% committed at school, resulting in 78 incidents that would be subject to arrest and may result in a hearing).
- -Representation and prosecution costs: None assumed, since juveniles arrested for bomb threats and aron 1 and 2 are already detained, and already receivere presentation and prosecution before the court indetention hearings.
- Jail costs: Almost all persons detained as a result of this bill are expected to be held in juvenile facilities. These detention costs would be considered by OAC, and are estimated at \$100 per day (based on OAC estimates). If a juvenile were held in an adult facility, costs would be approximately \$53 per day.
- Travel to detention facilities: Notaddressed are possible costs resulting from transporting juveniles under the age of 18 to neighboring facilities, since not all counties have sufficient capacity.
- -Potential impacts to local regional support networks (RSNs) to which the minors may be referred as provided by the bill are not addressed in this note as RSNs are generally funded through state and federal dollars (however, as indicated above, counties would be artheburden for any short fall sinfunding).
