This bill creates a new category of political committees, called "incidental committees." The bill defines "incidental committee," sets out the circumstances under which incidental committees must register with the PDC and report contributions and expenditures, and requires the PDC to adopt rules concerning the dissolution of incidental committees.

The bill also removes the alternative reporting scheme available under current law for political committees that are registered and reporting outside the state of Washington but active in Washington elections.

PDC makes the following workload assumptions to implement the requirements of this bill:

- 1. Reporting requirements and one or more forms will need to be revised (e.g., C-6, C-1pc), which will require modifying PDC's ORCA (online reporting of campaign activity) software, electronic filing system, and searchable campaign finance database. PDC assumes this work will require at least 140 hours of IT staff time to accomplish, \$6,710.
- 2. Existing instructional manuals, brochures, and training materials will need to be revised to accurately explain the new requirements, and additional outreach efforts will be needed to inform the regulated community about changes. PDC assumes this will require up to 40 hours of Outreach staff time to accomplish, \$1,260.
- 3. Currently, PDC receives a limited number of reports from out-of-state political committees.
- 4. The number of new incidental committees needing to register and report is indeterminate but expected to be more than a nominal impact on Compliance staff.
- 5. The number of complaints alleging violations of the new incidental committee requirements is indeterminate but expected to be relatively small, but PDC expects that the investigations involving these types of complaints will be relatively complex to complex.

Part V: New Rule Making Required

Identify provisions of the measure that require the agency to adopt new administrative rules or repeal/revise existing rules.

Section 2 adds a definition of "incidental committee" and changes the definitions of "political committee" which will require the Commission to amend existing WAC definitions and adopt new rules to be consistent with these definitional changes.

Sections 4, 5, 6, & 7 add new registration and reporting requirements for incidental committees, which will require the Commission to adopt new rules and amend existing rules and forms (which are adopted in rule) to conform with these new requirements. Section 5(9) specifically requires the Commission, by December 31, 2015, to adopt new rules for the dissolution of incidental committees.

Section 7 eliminates the option for "out-of-state" political committees to use an alternative reporting method. Existing Commission rules, forms, and explanatory materials will need to be amended to remove this alternative reporting method.
