Part II: Narrative Explanation

II. A - Brief Description Of What The Measure Does That Has Fiscal Impact on the Courts

Summary:

This bill would allow courts to order less restrictive mental health treatment for one year where the previous treatment was for intensive inpatient treatment in a state hospital.

Sections with potential court impact:

Section 1 would amend RCW 71.05.320 to allow the court to order less restrictive mental health treatment for one year where the previous treatment was for intensive inpatient treatment in a state hospital. Current law allows the court to order less restrictive mental health treatment for either 90 or 180 days only.

Section 2 would amend RCW 71.05.340 to require the court to consider particular criteria and make particular findings when deciding whether to modify the terms of an order which allowed treatment to be at a less restrictive alternative to treatment in a state hospital.

Anticipated Fiscal Impact:

Based upon information provided, it is assumed that there would be minimal financial impact to the superior courts statewide from the amendments/provisions in this bill.

Part II: Narrative Explanation

II. A - Brief Description Of What The Measure Does That Has Fiscal Impact

Briefly describe by section number, the significant provisions of the bill, and any related workload or policy assumptions, that have revenue or expenditure impact on the responding agency.

This bill amends RCW 71.05.320 and 71.05.340, relating to less restrictive alternative orders and conditional releases under the involuntary treatment act.

Section 1(7). A court may order an individual to be remanded for an additional time not exceeding 180 days if an individual's less restrictive order is revoked unless the individual's previous commitment was for intensive treatment in a state hospital then the individual could be remanded for up to one year.

Section 2(1)(e). In determining whether to modify the terms of the conditional release or return the person to the facility, the court must consider the symptoms and behavior of the person in light of all available evidence concerning the person's historical behavior, which may include information provided by credible witnesses and, if the petition is based on the person's failure to adhere to the terms or conditions of his or release, the court must give great weight to information regarding symptoms or behavior that: are closely associated with symptoms or behavior which preceded and led to a past incident of involuntary hospitalization, severe deterioration, or one or more violent acts; represents a marked and concerning change in the baseline behavior of the person; and, indicates that without modified terms or return of the person to the facility, continued deterioration is probable.

It is assumed that no expenditures reported in this analysis would be matched under Medicaid Title XIX.

II. C - Expenditures

The average number of individuals under a less restrictive alternative that were not reinstated to the hospital was 213 between 2012 through 2014, the department estimates that five percent, eleven people, would revoke back to the state hospitals each year under the conditions outlined in this bill. The department assumes they would need an additional 15 bed civil ward at Western State Hospital to accommodate these individuals.

Approximately 21.9 FTE would be needed to staff the new ward based on the ratios used historically to staff a conditional release ward. Positions are assumed to begin on April 1, 2016 to allow for ward renovations and enough time for staff to be trained before patients begin admission. Patient ancillary costs for each individual are estimated to be about \$9,100 per person. The total fiscal impact for the operating budget is estimated to be \$719,000 GF-State in Fiscal Year 2016 and \$2,155,000 GF-State in each Fiscal Year thereafter.

An additional 15 bed civil ward would be needed at Western State Hospital to support the number of individuals that are anticipated to revoke back to the hospitals as outlined in this bill. It is assumed that an existing day treatment facility would be renovated. The department estimates that it would cost \$250,000 to design and plan for renovation and that renovation itself would cost \$1,500,000 in Fiscal Year 2016 only. No other capital costs are estimated for this project.

Part IV: Analysis A. SUMMARY OF BILL

Provide a clear, succinct description of the bill with an emphasis on how it impacts local government.

Section 1 amends RCW 71.05.320 to establish that an order for less restrictive treatment may be for up to one year when the person's previous commitment term was for intensive inpatient treatment in a state hospital.

Section 2 amends RCW 71.05.340. In determining whether or not to modify the terms of conditional release or return the person to the facility, the court must consider the symptoms and behavior of the person in light of all available evidence concerning the person's historical behavior. If the petition is based on the person's failure to adhere to the terms or conditions of his or her release, the court must give great weight to information regarding symptoms that are closely associated with behavior which led to a past incident of involuntary hospitalization or violent acts; represent a marked change in the baseline behavior of the person; and indicate that continued deterioration is probable.

B. SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURE IMPACTS

Briefly describe and quantify the expenditure impacts of the legislation on local governments, identifying the expenditure provisions by section number, and when appropriate, the detail of expenditures. Delineate between city, county and special district impacts.

The legislation would result in increased costs for the 11 regional support networks (RSNs), which would likely see an increased caseload of persons referred for less restrictive treatment under the bill. Total costs are indeterminate.

Less restrictive treatment requires a person has to enter outpatient treatment as the court order dictates. Most often the court order will specify that the person has to participate in treatment at a mental health center and must take such medication as is recommended by it.

RSNs would therefore see increased costs for treatment for persons ordered to attend counseling or receive other services at a RSN. These costs would include time for a designated mental health professional (DMHP) to provide case management for the person.

BACKGROUND:

Counties administer, and in many cases deliver, out-patient and community in-patient mental health services for adults and children. Mental health services are currently funded through a combination of federal, state, local government, public and private hospital, and private insurance funds. Counties, mostly through joint service agreements (11 Regional Service Networks or RSNs) manage a service system through pre-paid health plans for out-patient and in-patient mental health treatment paid for by the state (approximately 80 percent state and federal sources) and local funds (approximately 20 percent from earmarked county property taxes, sales tax and user fees). The state and hospitals primarily provide in-patient treatment in the mental health arena. The state contracts with RSNs to provide a range of community-based programs using a funding formula that is based on the size of the county's Medicaid population. RSNs in turn contract with and oversee providers or provide services themselves.
