RCW 70.220.040 provides that the Governor shall provide funding to the Academy for the expense of any investigation or report on questions of sciences referred to the Academy by the Legislature.

HB 2273 The legislation directs the Washington Academy of Sciences to establish a study committee to examine scientific, ethical, and societal issues associated with human genome editing.

Section 2 The Washington academy of sciences formed under this chapter must establish a study committee to examine scientific, ethical, and societal issues associated with human genome editing and to inform legislative approaches to safe and ethically responsible uses of human genome editing.

By October 1, 2021, and in compliance with RCW 43.01.036, the study committee must submit to the relevant committees of the legislature a report that summarizes the activities and findings of the study committee and recommends the guiding principles for regulating human genome editing.

Section 2 The Washington academy of sciences formed under this chapter must establish a study committee to examine scientific, ethical, and societal issues associated with human genome editing and to inform legislative approaches to safe and ethically responsible uses of human genome editing.

For purposes of this fiscal note, WSAS would require at least one public meeting and at least two or more committee meetings. Establishing and organizing the study committee would entail .50 FTE the first year (salaries and benefits \$50,606) and .25 FTE the second year (salaries and benefits \$25,303). Other costs associated with the study committee would include, goods and services of \$6,000, and travel for committee members of \$2,500.

Other costs to establish a study committee include 15% overhead charge WSAS charges for all projects to cover the costs of negotiating and preparing pre-contract materials and to cover the costs of doing business. The indirect costs are in the Inter Agency/Fund Transfer line.

By October 1, 2021, and in compliance with RCW 43.01.036, the study committee must submit to the relevant committees of the legislature a report that summarizes the activities and findings of the study committee and recommends the guiding principles for regulating human genome editing. In order to prepare and publish the report, WSAS would contract with two professional writers, one to prepare a summary of the public meeting and the other to prepare the draft of the committee report. These contracts would total \$25,000. (\$16,675 the first year and \$8,325 the second year).

WSU will be reimbursed by the Office of the Governor with an Interagency reimbursement. Therefore, this fiscal note balances to zero, however WSU's fiscal impact is \$83,895 the first year and \$41,928 the second year.
