The UTC assumes this bill has no fiscal impact. The commission is considered a limited authority Washington law enforcement agency but does not designate its employees as peace officers as authorized to do so in law. The only potential impact to the UTC is if UTC investigators obtained a copy of a video recording of a regulated commercial vehicle accident from the Washington State Patrol in the course of its investigation. If this were to occur, UTC would need to determine whether or not the recording is subject to public inspection or exempt as detailed in this bill.

There is no fiscal impact to the Washington State Patrol (WSP) from this legislation.

Per subsection 1(14)(f) of this legislation, an agency may provide an unredacted copy of body worn camera recordings to a defendant's attorney or defense agency in a criminal matter without the disclosure being considered highly offensive, if the defendant's attorney or defense agency would otherwise be entitled to receive an unredacted copy in the course of discovery in a criminal matter. There are restrictions on its custody and usage beyond that in this legislation.

If an individual is entitled to an unredacted copy of body worn camera recordings per subsection 1(14)(f), according to subsection 1(14)(e)(ii), an agency may charge the requesting individual for the costs to redact, alter, distort, pixelate, suppress, or otherwise obscure any portion of the recording.

We would like to point out that we currently have a decision package in the Governor's proposed budget for 2023-25 that would provide funding to equip our officers with body-worn cameras. If that request is funded, and if this legislation passes, we may need to seek funding to comply with this legislation. The legislation is written permissively, though RCW 42.56.030 directs that the Public Records Act shall be liberally construed and its exemption narrowly construed. Costs that we might need to consider at that time are workload to properly understand and administer this statute consistent with criminal discovery rules, workload to assess costs to establish an appropriate billing rate, contracting workload to establish written agreements, fiscal workload to bill and receipt for services, workload to do video editing as requested by the defense attorney, and workload for additional engagement with prosecutors related to fulfilling this legislation.

House Bill 1080 modifies the statute governing the release of police body worn camera footage. It allows a defendant's attorneys or defense agency to receive unredacted body camera footage prior to the discovery phase of a criminal case. The defense attorneys or agency must sign a written agreement that states the purposes for which the footage can be used and limits who the unredacted footage can be disclosed to. The measure also allows law enforcement agencies to charge for redactions of body camera footage if the redactions are requested by a party otherwise entitled to the unredacted footage.

Section 1(14)(e)(ii) allows law enforcement agencies to charge individuals for redactions to body camera footage if those individuals would otherwise be entitled to receive unredacted footage. At this point, UW anticipates charging \$0.75 for each minute staff spends working on redactions requested under this provision. However, the University is not able to estimate with any certainty how many separate redaction requests will be received under this section, or the average time that the redaction process will take for each request, as UWPD's body camera system was only implemented in June 2022. Therefore, any positive cash receipts to UW from this provision are indeterminate.

Section 1(14)(f)(i) allows law enforcement agencies to provide unredacted body camera footage to a defendant's attorneys or defense agency prior to discovery in a criminal case. UW expects any associated costs can be absorbed using existing resources, as UW already has procedures in place to provide body camera footage to authorized requesting entities.

Section 1(14)(f)(ii)(a) requires a defendant's attorneys or defense agency to sign a written agreement before unredacted body camera footage is released to them. While processing these agreements may require some additional work by UW staff, it is expected that any associated costs can be absorbed using existing resources.

HB 1080 amends and expands guidance related to the release and use of unredacted law enforcement body camera recordings, provides CWU the ability to charge for redacted recordings when the individual making the request is entitled to receive an unredacted copy, and requires a written agreement to be maintained by the agency.

CWU will need to create and obtain AAG review and approval of a newly written agreement as detailed in RCW 42.56.240 (14)(f)(i)(A). Also, more precise review time will be needed for each request to determine what section of the RCW the production of the record must follow. In addition, the agency will need to manage and maintain the signed agreement for the designated retention period approved by the Secretary of State. A DocuSign template will need to be created to process and maintain the required agreement.

In order to implement the proposed legislation, we estimate 20 hours of time for the Director of Business Services to review, create and process the newly required agreement for legal approval by our AAG. 2 hours of AAG time charged back to the agency should also be factored. Estimated 8 hours of time to create a template and DocuSign process for the newly required agreement, as well as any costs related to the DocuSign license, implementation and electronic storage of the required agreement. CWU will absorb labor costs related to implementation, but costs related to system upgrades and storage are indeterminate without knowing the exact requirements.

Routinely the release of body worn camera footage is too large to email, the cost of a USB device and actual mailing charges are always paid by the requestor before the footage is released. Under the current proposed bill, it is unclear if an agency would be able to recover those costs from the requestor. If we are not able to recover actual cost, this would result in a per release loss to the agency of \$18.23 for the USB device and standard shipping costs.

In addition to the implementation of the new requirement, our agency will be required to spend additional time to review each body worn camera request to determine if the written agreement is required. Additional time will be spent to review, process, manage and retain the request for body worn camera recordings and the written agreement as detailed in the RCW. If not managed and applied appropriately by the agency, this legislation could result in violations of public record laws which would likely result in monetary penalties being assessed against the agency.

Overall, we do expect some effort and resources to be needed in order to comply with HB 1080, but without knowing the technology requirements or the number of requests that will need to comply with this bill, the impact is indeterminate.

Section-14(e)(ii) amends RCW-42.56.240 to require a requesting party pay the costs of redacting a body worn camera recording except when the requestor is otherwise eligible to receive an unredacted copy under subsection (f).

Section-14(f)(i) adds a new section which allows certain parties to obtain an unredacted copy of a body worn camera recording if otherwise entitled to receive it during discovery in a criminal matter.

Section-14(f)(ii) places restrictions on further distribution of the unredacted recording and when it may be used in legal proceedings. Violations may result in sanctions.

Note: Previous analysis of Bill #1991 S HB resulted in no fiscal impact for affected state agencies. This amendment allows for assessment of fees when providing a redacted copy of the body worn camera.

This bill should be of very minimal impact unless we have a lot of criminal proceedings with discovery

Section 1 details when certain investigative, law enforcement, and crime victim information is exempt from public inspection and copying. Sub-section (14) describes when body worn camera recordings are exempt from public inspection and copying to the extent nondisclosure is essential for the protection of any person's right to privacy. More specifically, if a requesting individual is entitled to receive an unredacted copy of a body worn camera recording, an agency may charge the requesting individual for redaction costs. However, if an individual is entitled to receive an unredacted copy of a body worn camera recording, they may not be required to pay costs for an unredacted copy.

Additional changes to RCW 42.56.240 in this bill detail when agencies may provide an unredacted copy of body worn camera recordings to a defendant's attorney, attorneys, or defense agency in a criminal matter.

RCW 10.109.030 prohibits WSPRC from using body worn cameras. Accordingly, the sections of this bill described above pertaining to disclosure of body worn camera recordings do not have revenue or expenditure impacts on WSPRC.

Since State Parks is prohibited from using body warn cameras, this legislation would have no impact on the agency.

Part IV: Analysis A. SUMMARY OF BILL

Description of the bill with an emphasis on how it impacts local government.

The proposed legislation would amend an RCW section related to body worn cameras.

Section 1 would amend RCW 42.56.240, allowing law enforcement agencies to provide unredacted copies of body worn camera recordings to a defendant's attorney(s) or defense agency in a criminal matter who would otherwise be entitled to receive an unredacted copy of such footage in the course of discovery. Law enforcement agencies would be allowed to charge requesting attorneys for the costs of redacting, altering, distorting, pixelating, suppressing, or otherwise obscuring any portion of body camera footage if a requestor eligible to receive an unredacted copy of the footage under subsection 1 (14) (f) of the bill asked for a redacted copy.

Any individual requesting unredacted footage under that subsection may not be required to pay costs to obtain that copy.

B. SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURE IMPACTS

Expenditure impacts of the legislation on local governments with the expenditure provisions identified by section number and when appropriate, the detail of expenditures. Delineated between city, county and special district impacts.

The proposed legislation would have an indeterminate impact on local government expenditures.

Local law enforcement agencies would likely see no expenditure impact as a result of this bill's provisions. The Washington Defender Association (WDA) anticipates no change in the volume of requests for body worn camera footage since defendants' attorneys would need to be already entitled to receive such footage in order to be eligible under the new provision. Unredacted body camera footage would not require processing, and if a requestor eligible under subsection 1 (14) (f) asked for redacted footage, law enforcement agencies could charge the requestor for the costs of redaction.

The expenditure impact of this bill on public defenders is indeterminate. According to the WDA, there may be cost savings associated with not having to spend attorney time obtaining body worn camera footage through the discovery process. It is unknown how many body worn camera footage disclosures might fall under the provisions of this bill or how much time this process may save defenders in a given case, however, so the magnitude of this expenditure impact on public defenders is indeterminate.

C. SUMMARY OF REVENUE IMPACTS

Revenue impacts of the legislation on local governments, with the revenue provisions identified by section number, and when appropriate, the detail of revenue sources. Delineated between city, county and special district impacts.

The proposed legislation would have no impact on local government revenues.

If a person eligible to receive an unredacted copy of body camera footage under subsection 1 (14) (f) requested a redacted copy of such footage, law enforcement agencies could charge the requestor for those costs, but these charges would likely represent a de minimis impact on agency revenues.
