Part II: Narrative Explanation

II. A - Brief Description Of What The Measure Does That Has Fiscal Impact

Section 1 is a new section (1) directing the Washington State Health Care Authority (HCA) to establish the Washington State Count the Kicks program effective December 31, 2023 and to adopt a platform to record and track fetal movements and encourage monitoring practices for awareness of fetal movements. (2) The count the kicks program shall be incorporated into the Title 19/Medicaid maternity care access program as referenced in RCW 74.09.800. (3) The authority shall adopt rules to implement this section.

Section 2(6) amends RCW 74.09.800 and directs HCA to implement a broad-based public education program that stresses the importance of obtaining maternity care early during pregnancy and reducing the incidence of stillbirth with programs including, but not limited to, the national Count the Kicks program.

II. B - Cash Receipts Impact

HCA assumes all costs are eligible for the Title 19 Medicaid Federal Financial Participation match rate of 50 percent.

II. C - Expenditures

HCA estimates it would require \$620,000 (\$309,000) GF-S and 1.0 Full Time Equivalent (FTE) staff in the 2023-25 biennium and then \$50,000 (\$25,000) GF-S per year thereafter to implement this bill.

Section 1 – Washington State Count the Kicks program

The core framework of the national Count the Kicks model is free and includes:

- Count the Kicks mobile app available in 16 languages
- Social Media Toolkit with suggested posts to facilitate sharing the Count the Kicks campaign on HCA social platforms
- Digital Provider Resources available on the Count the Kicks website
- Quarterly and annual data reports
- Regular status calls regarding the progress of the campaign in Washington State

However, the generic core framework is insufficient to address the specific needs of Washington State. Therefore, HCA estimates it will cost \$50,000 per year to alter the framework to meet state program needs. These changes include:

- A public relations bundle that would provide an annual series of press release templates surrounding major dates (the launch of Count the Kicks, Mother's Day, Black Maternal Health Week, Stillbirth Prevention Month, etc.) that HCA can share via communication channels.
- Targeted social media posts.
- Social determinants of health survey on the web application. Users are directed to resources.
 Responses and uptake are reported back to HCA.
- Digital and billboard advertisements.
- Health worker trainings.

HCA assumes this framework would be the "platform" adopted to record and track fetal movements and encourage the monitoring of fetal movements. HCA assumes it is not being directed to develop a new IT "platform" for this purpose. The cost and time it would take to design, development and implement a new system would be significant and may prevent HCA from implementing this platform by December 31, 2023.

Section 2(6) - Broad-based public education program

HCA estimates it would require \$250,000 (\$125,000) GF-S in fiscal year 2024 to contract with a marketing/communications firm to create and launch a broad-based public education program to meet the requirements of Section 2(6). Deliverables include:

- Video(s).
- Dedicated website for Washington State and associated outreach and training elements.
- Creating new page(s) and content on hca.wa.gov site that links to Count the Kicks website.
- Translating materials and providing other language access services, such as captioning, transcribing, and interpreting.
- Program materials and photography (similar to our Starts With One and Tribal Starts With One campaigns).
- Community engagement, including gathering feedback from the communities and individuals who would be impacted by this program and getting their buy-in. Include interviews and focus groups.
- Social media campaign and buy ads to promote this program in the regions we need to focus on.
- Market research and learning/knowing how to communicate with whom this program is intended (to avoid pitfalls and blunders, increase our own awareness, minimize risk, etc.).
- Collaborate and partner with other state agencies, local health jurisdictions, Tribes, community-based organizations, health care providers, Accountable Communities of Health, and others to share information about this program.

Sections 1 and 2 – Staffing Resources

HCA estimates it will require the following staffing resources to implement this bill:

1.0 FTE Communications Consultant 3 (CC3) - Temporary two-year appointment to assist with the implementation of the Washington State Count the Kicks program and a broad-based public education program that complies with Section 1 and 2(6) of this bill. The CC3 would assume the lead communications role once the implementation is complete.

After the CC3 appointments ends, maintenance of the Washington State Count the Kicks program and public education program will be absorbed by existing HCA Communications staff.

The Office of Tribal Affairs (OTA) would support HCA and Tribal partners in adopting the platform and developing materials for this work. OTE does not require an additional FTE, the increase in workload would be absorbed by current staff.
