Current law requires a unique identifier be assigned to each registered voter in the state. This bill requires the unique identifier be the voter's Washington state driver's license number or identicard number. If the voter has neither number, the voter must be assigned a unique number that will become the voter's driver's or identicard number upon application for such documents.

OSOS estimates it would take approximately 300 hours of development time at \$200 per hour, for a total cost of \$60,000 to make the necessary change to the Voter Registration System.

Additionally, the interface between VoteWA and DOL would need to be redesigned or enhanced to support the assignment of a voter ID that could later be used as a driver's license or identicard number and some unknown method to identify if the voter already has a driver's license or identicard. OSOS would use contractors for these services. Projects with similar technical efforts using contractors have ranged from \$300,000-\$400,000 to design, develop, test, and implement.

Part 2 – Explanation

This bill requires that a registered voter's unique identifier assigned through the Secretary of State now match their Washington driver's license or identicard number. If a voter does not have a driver's license or identicard issued by the Department of Licensing (DOL), they will be assigned a unique identification number that will become their driver's license or identicard number upon application for one.

2.A - Brief Description Of What The Measure Does That Has Fiscal Impact

Section 1 amends RCW 29A.08.125 to require that a registered voter's "unique identifier" assigned through the Secretary of State's (SOS) Office now match their Washington driver's license or identicard number. If a voter does not have a driver's license or identicard, they will be assigned a unique identification number that will become their driver's license or identicard number upon application for one.

2.B - Cash receipts Impact

This bill will not have an impact on cash receipts. There are no changes to fees or anticipated revenue collections for the department.

2.C - Expenditures

The operational and systems impacts of this bill are indeterminate until implementation design and planning work are completed. During implementation development and following full implementation, the department will assess resource needs and submit a request as necessary in a future budget cycle.

DOL expects that several functional areas would be impacted. The types of work done and the positions supporting that work are outlined below.

Assumptions:

- DOL assumes that a new portal would be created to allow the SOS to issue new driver's license and identicard numbers to newly registered voters.
- DOL assumes that the new portal would also allow SOS to search for already existing accounts and if an existing account is found it would tie their data to DRIVES data.

System implementation and integration with the SOS would increase workload for DOL units to manage exceptions. Manual exception processing and merging records data requires work to move over data between source record accounts and primary accounts. This work is typically accomplished by Customer Service Specialist 2,3, and 4s, depending on complexity and frequency of work.

DOL assumes there will be an increased workload to the Driver and Vehicle investigations team related to fraud, and changes of license number requests. Currently the SOS process is to mail out your information on a postcard. Lost or misdelivered mail could increase fraud cases. This work is typically accomplished by Investigator 1, 2, and 3s, depending on complexity and frequency of work.

DOL is transitioning from permanent driver's license numbers to random generated numbers. The possibility of mismatched voter numbers and driver's license or identicard numbers could result in

additional calls to the departments Customer Service Center. These calls are typically managed by Customer Service Specialist 2 positions.

Information Services:

Similar to operations-related expenses, the level of effort to modify the department's information technology systems is indeterminate until implementation design and planning work are completed. The types of modifications expected are outlined below.

What DOL will implement:

DRIVES - Indeterminate

If DRIVES implements a solution where SOS interfaces with the department to receive real-time updates on "unique identified" numbers issued by their office, the following system change may be needed:

- 1. Modify existing interface voter verification service with new data element to provide the driver/identicard number.
- 2. New interface and logic to interface with Secretary of State to confirm when a new account is created in DRIVES to confirm if a unique identifier has already by issued by the Secretary of State. If it does, the department will use the number as that credential number. Changes include updates to:
 - a. Online issuance
 - b. Headquarters Issuance
 - c. Back-office record creation
 - d. Webservices with courts and law enforcement when a non-driver account is created.
- 3. New case/work items for records issued, but error because a different license number was issued by Secretary of State.
- 4. Modify merge record logic to allow updating/merging records with different license numbers issued by the Secretary of State.
- 5. Interface to send Secretary of State unassigned credential numbers that can be issued when a voter registers and does not have a driver or license number.
- 6. One-time database pass to send the most recent driver records so Secretary of State can update their records with the current license number on the department's record.
- 7. New reports on errors caused by variance in the department issued credential numbers versus Secretary of State issued number.
- 8. New letters to update the customer when a credential number is changing.
- 9. Modify logic including screens to add reason for no-fee issued credentials when the number issued by Secretary of State does not match the departments.
- 10. New security updates for new case/letters/reports.

Ongoing Maintenance: Ongoing monthly maintenance for interface

Security Assessment: Full security assessment and analysis for new interface and added data elements.
