The bill establishes procedures for attorneys to obtain body camera footage. It requires an attorney to pay for redaction, altering, distorting ect for body camera recordings and it requires agencies that have law enforcement or corrections agency body worn camera records to follow the public disclosure requires when dealing with such recordings. The only potential impact to the UTC is if UTC investigators obtained a copy of a video recording of a regulated commercial vehicle accident from the Washington State Patrol in the course of its investigation. If this were to occur, UTC would need to determine whether or not the recording is subject to public inspection or exempt as detailed in this bill.

UTC assumes there is no fiscal impact resulting from this legislation. The UTC is a limited law enforcement agency but does not commission employees as peace officers, nor does it enforce criminal law. The UTC does not issue or require its employees to use body cameras during their investigations. UTC employees do not receive certification as criminal justice personnel.

According to subsection 1(14)(e)(ii), an agency may charge the requesting individual (attorney) for the costs to redact, alter, distort, pixelate, suppress, or otherwise obscure any portion of a body camera recording received through the discovery process if that person is a party in a criminal or civil case on file in any court concerning the recorded incident. Subsections 1(14)(e)(i)(B) through (D) describe when this may apply.

If we were to obtain them in the future, and requestor requests editing per subsection 1(14)(e)(ii) for use in a criminal or civil case on file in any court concerning the recorded incident, we could charge the requestor for such costs allowable under the narrow interpretations in public disclosure law.

We would like to point out that we currently have a decision package in the Governor's proposed budget for 2023-25 that would provide funding to equip our officers with body-worn cameras. If that request is funded, and if this legislation passes, we may need to seek funding to comply with this legislation. The legislation is written permissively, though RCW 42.56.030 directs that the Public Records Act shall be liberally construed and its exemption narrowly construed. Costs that we might need to consider at that time are workload to properly understand and administer this statute consistent with criminal discovery rules, workload to assess costs to establish an appropriate billing rate, contracting workload to establish written agreements, fiscal workload to bill and receipt for services, workload to do video editing as requested by receipts of video, and workload for additional engagement with prosecutors related to fulfilling this legislation.

1080-S AMS Law S2604.1 is a striking amendment to Substitute House Bill 1080. It modifies the statutes governing the release of police body worn camera footage.

Compared with the substitute bill, the amendment:

- Restores current statutory language allowing a right to access body worn camera recordings for an attorney
 representing a person directly involved in an incident, a person or the person's attorney in a criminal case
 involving that person, or an attorney who represents a person regarding a potential or existing civil cause of
 action involving the denial of civil rights under the federal or state Constitution, or a violation of a United
 States department of justice settlement agreement.
- Establishes procedures for an attorney to identify any body worn camera recordings that the attorney has received through the discovery process.
- Provides that any body worn camera recording responsive to a Public Records Act request that was not received by an attorney through the discovery process shall be provided to the attorney free of cost.
- Requires an attorney to pay for redacting, altering, distorting, pixelating, suppressing, or otherwise
 obscuring any portion of a body worn camera recording that was identified by the attorney as having
 been received through the discovery process.
- Requires any agency that possesses law enforcement or corrections agency body worn camera recordings to follow the public disclosure procedures and exemptions from disclosure for such recordings.

Part IV: Analysis A. SUMMARY OF BILL

Description of the bill with an emphasis on how it impacts local government.

This fiscal note analyzes the impact of 1080 S HB AMS LAW S2604.1, comparing it to the impact of SHB 1080.

CHANGES BETWEEN THIS VERSION AND PREVIOUS BILL VERSION:

The amendment to SHB 1080 would reintroduce certain provisions currently in RCW 42.56.240 that concern attorney access to body worn camera footage in certain situations, and would have been removed by SHB 1080. The amendment would also specify when attorneys requesting body worn camera footage in the above situations would be required to pay the costs of "redacting, altering, distorting, pixelating, suppressing or otherwise obscuring any portion" of that footage.

These changes would not impact the local government expenditure or revenue impacts below.

SUMMARY OF CURRENT BILL:

The proposed legislation would amend disclosure requirements related to body worn cameras.

Section 1 would amend RCW 42.56.240, reintroducing provisions currently in statute giving attorneys the right to access body worn camera footage if they are representing a person directly involved in an incident recorded by a body worn camera, a person involved in a criminal case where a body worn camera recording is relevant, or a person involved in a civil cause of action involving the denial of constitutional civil rights or a violation of a Department of Justice settlement agreement where a body worn camera recording is relevant.

The amendments in this section would also allow law enforcement agencies to charge for the costs of "redacting, altering, distorting, pixelating, suppressing, or otherwise obscuring any portion" of body camera footage if an attorney identifies that footage as having been received through the discovery process. If an attorney identifies that footage responsive to their request has not been received through the discovery process, law enforcement agencies may not charge for such costs.

Attorneys making requests for footage in the above situations would also be required to identify the "date, time, location, and incident or incidents" of any body worn camera footage they have received through the discovery process.

B. SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURE IMPACTS

Expenditure impacts of the legislation on local governments with the expenditure provisions identified by section number and when appropriate, the detail of expenditures. Delineated between city, county and special district impacts.

The proposed legislation would have no impact on local government expenditures.

The Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs does not anticipate any change in the volume of requests for body worn camera footage as a result of this bill's provisions, and indicates that accordingly, local law enforcement agencies would likely see no expenditure impacts.

C. SUMMARY OF REVENUE IMPACTS

Revenue impacts of the legislation on local governments, with the revenue provisions identified by section number, and when appropriate, the detail of revenue sources. Delineated between city, county and special district impacts.

The proposed legislation would have no impact on local government revenues.

Local law enforcement agencies charge varying rates for the costs of redacting body worn camera footage, typically charging by the minute. The Washington Association of Sheriffs and Police Chiefs (WASPC) indicates that redacting one minute of body worn camera footage requires about six minutes of staff time.

According to the 2023 Local Government Fiscal Note Program Criminal Justice Cost Model, the average hourly salary plus benefits and overhead for an evidence or records clerk in a local law enforcement agency is \$41. Any agencies

charging less than 0.68 cents per minute for redaction would not be covering the costs of a \$41 average hourly salary plus benefits and overhead.

Accordingly, WASPC indicates that expanding the list of situations in which law enforcement agencies could charge for the costs of redacting body worn camera footage would not create any new revenue for local law enforcement agencies.
