The bill does not direct the Department of Natural Resources (DNR) to do any work, it only allows the expansion of leasing to include assets.

The bill expands leasing to include assets. DNR assumes an increase in revenue for leasing assets but the type, duration, amount, and number of leases is unknown.

DNR has no history of leasing water rights so there are many unknowns for the actual valuation. As an example of potential, the California Nasdaq water trading index shows average prices per acre foot. At the current price, a single 400/acre/ft water right would lease for \$81,200. For this example, most agricultural water rights are on federally granted lands so 69 percent of revenue would go to Fund 113 Common School Construction Account and 31 percent would go to Fund 041 Resource Management Cost Account.
