## Part IV: Analysis

### A. SUMMARY OF BILL

*Description of the bill with an emphasis on how it impacts local government.*

- (1) Authorizes the secretary or the secretary's designee to issues a prescription or standing order for any biological product, device, or drug for purposes of controlling and preventing the spread of, mitigating, or treating any infectious or noninfectious disease or threat to the public health.
- (2) Outlines what is required of the secretary or the secretary's designee to issues a prescription or standing order.
- (4) The secretary or the secretary's designee may place limitations on the use of a prescription or standing order issued pursuant to this section and should include appropriate recommendations for follow-up care.
- (5) Before issuing a standing order pursuant to this section, unless doing so would result in a delay that is likely to endanger the public health, the secretary or the secretary's designee must solicit and consider the recommendations of the local health officers for the geographic areas to which the standing order will apply and, in the discretion of the secretary or the secretary's designee, stakeholders and persons with relevant knowledge.
- (6) Authorizes the secretary, the secretary's designee, and department employees may acquire, possess, deliver, dispense, and administer a biological product, device, or drug pursuant to a prescription or standing order issued under this section if the individual holds a valid, unexpired, unrevoked, and unsuspended license in this state.

### B. SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURE IMPACTS

This bill would not impact local government expenditures.

Local Health Officers (LHOs) already have authority to provide standing orders for their jurisdiction, and this bill ensures that local orders are not preempted. It also requires Department of Health to consult LHOs before making an order. There already exists a forum for consultation that occurs so no additional meetings or costs are expected.
