Part IV: Analysis

A. SUMMARY OF BILL

Description of the bill with an emphasis on how it impacts local government.

This bill requires certain cities and towns to allow neighborhood cafes to be permitted in residential zones.

Section 1 creates a new section in chapter 35.21 RCW which requires cities and towns to allow neighborhood cafés to be permitted in residential zones if certain conditions are met. A definition of "neighborhood café" is included which means an establishment that serves a limited menu of food items and does not contain more than 2,000 square feet of gross floor area.

The bill takes effect 90 days after adjournment of the session in which the bill is passed.

B. SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURE IMPACTS

Expenditure impacts of the legislation on local governments with the expenditure provisions identified by section number and when appropriate, the detail of expenditures. Delineated between city, county and special district impacts.

This legislation would have a determinate impact on 83 first class/charter cities, second class cities, and towns in Title 35. These jurisdictions would need to amend their zoning codes and maps, and development regulations.

These costs start at approximately \$13,000 and includes work by planning department staff to review local code, draft the ordinances, and prepare staff reports all the way through to passing the ordinance by the city council. There would be another \$6,000 for the SEPA project checklist review that would be conducted concurrently with the draft ordinance and ready by final passage of the ordinance by the city council. If there is a zoning change component to the bill, there would be costs for amending zoning and land use maps, then any digitally accessible of physical copies of those maps, adding another \$5,000. This equates to roughly \$24,000 in costs per impacted city.

83 cities x \$24,000 = \$1,992,000
