IMPROVING SCHOOL SAFETY BY EXTENDING AND INCREASING PENALTIES FOR INTERENCE FORCE OR VIOLENCE AT SCHOOLS AND ATHLETIC EVENTS

SUMMARY

A brief description of what the measure does that has fiscal impact.

- Section 1 States the legislative intent is to increase the penalty for those perpetrating violence against students and school.
- Section 2 Amends RCW 28A.635.090 (Interference by force or violence—Penalty) by expanding the definition of the offense by including an official, or volunteer acting as an official, for extracurricular athletic activities of elementary or secondary students.
- Section 3 Amends RCW 28A.635.100 (Intimidating any administrator, teacher, classified employee, or student by threat of force or violence unlawful—Penalty) by expanding the definition of the offense by including an official, or volunteer acting as an official, for extracurricular athletic activities of elementary or secondary students.

Impact Summary.

This bill:

• Expands the definitions of two existing gross misdemeanor offenses.

Impact on prison and jail beds.

This bill expands the definition of two gross misdemeanor offenses. The Caseload Forecast Council does not collect data on misdemeanor and gross misdemeanor offenses, and, therefore, cannot reliably estimate bed impacts resulting from the bill.

However, as gross misdemeanor offenses are punishable by a term of confinement of 0-364 days in jail, any impact should manifest itself as an increased need for jail beds only.

Impact on local detention and Juvenile Rehabilitation beds.

The bill expands the definition of two gross misdemeanor offenses that are considered as Category D on the juvenile grid. As Category D offenses, they are punishable by Local Sanctions (0-30 days in local juvenile detention). Therefore, increased incidence of this offense would likely impact only local juvenile detention beds.

In addition, there may also be an increased need for Juvenile Rehabilitation (JR) beds. Current statutes require individuals sentenced in adult court for an offense committed before the age of 18 to serve to their confinement at a JR facility until age 25, or until release if occurring prior to age 25. As less than 1% of all sentences in the adult system are committed by those less than age 18, it assumed any impacts to JR would be minimal.

Comparison 2079 HB to 2079 SHB:

The substitute bill restores the current classifications, maximum fines, and maximum terms of confinement for the offenses of Interference by Force or Violence and Intimidation by Threat of Force or Violence.

2079 HB

The original bill amended RCW 28A.635.090 and 28A.635.100 by increasing the penalties for interference by or intimidation by threat of force or violence at schools and athletic activities, by public school students, school employee or contractors to a class C felony.

It also expanded the definition of gross misdemeanors to include school officials, volunteers acting as an official, for extracurricular athletic activities of elementary of secondary students.

Substitute House Bill (SHB) 2079 differs from previous versions of this bill as follows:

- Section 2(3) removes language from the original bill that increased the classification of Interference by force or violence from a gross misdemeanor to a Class C felony offense.
- Section 3(2) removes language from the original bill that increased the classification of Intimidating any administrator, teacher, classified employee, or student by threat of force or violence unlawful from a gross misdemeanor to a Class C felony offense.

The following impacts from the original bill remain unchanged in the substitute:

- Section 2(1) expands the definition of the offense of Interference by force or violence by including an official or volunteer acting as an official for extracurricular athletic activities of elementary or secondary students.
- Section 3(1) expands the definition of the offense of Intimidating any administrator, teacher, classified employee, or student by threat of force or violence unlawful by including an official, or volunteer acting as an official, for extracurricular athletic activities of elementary or secondary students.

The effective date is assumed to be 90 days after the adjournment of the session in which this bill is passed.

Changes in SHB 2079 compared to HB2079

Section 1(3)

Language amended to remove that the penalty for violence against students and school staff would match the penalty for assault on school bus drivers.

Section 2(3)

Language amended to add that a person violating this section is guilty of a gross misdemeanor and shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars, imprisoned not more than six months, or both such fine and imprisonment. Language removed stating the penalty would be a class C felony punishable under chapter 9A.20 RCW.

Section 3(2)

Language amended to add that a person violating this section is guilty of a gross misdemeanor and shall be fined not more than five hundred dollars, imprisoned not more than six months, or both such fine and imprisonment. Language removed stating the penalty would be a class C felony punishable under chapter 9A.20 RCW.

Summary of SHB 2079

Section 1 - NEW

- (1) Incidents of violence in schools raise concerns about school safety. The legislature recognizes that if violence is tolerated it tends to escalate. Legislature intends to provide targeted and appropriate sanctions for violence interfering with school activities before it can rise to a grievous level.

Part IV: Analysis

A. SUMMARY OF BILL

Description of the bill with an emphasis on how it impacts local government.

CHANGES BETWEEN THIS VERSION AND PRIOR VERSION OF BILL:

The substitute version of the bill returns the penalties for school interference and threats to gross misdemeanors. In the previous version these were classified as felonies. This change reduces the indeterminate expenditure impacts discussed below.

SUMMARY OF BILL:

Sections 2 and 3 amend RCW 28A.635.090 and RCW 28A.635.100, respectively. It is unlawful for any person to interfere by force or violence with an employee or contractor of a public or private elementary or secondary school, an elementary or secondary student, or an official, or volunteer acting as an official, for extracurricular athletic activities of elementary or secondary students, while that person is in the peaceful discharge or conduct of his or her duties or studies.

A person violating these sections is guilty of a gross misdemeanor and shall be fined not more than \$500, or imprisoned in jail not more than six months, or both such fine and imprisonment.

B. SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURE IMPACTS

Expenditure impacts of the legislation on local governments with the expenditure provisions identified by section number and when appropriate, the detail of expenditures. Delineated between city, county and special district impacts.

The legislation would have indeterminate expenditure impacts for law enforcement, prosecutors, court-appointed defense attorneys, and county jails, due to the expansion of two gross misdemeanor charges.

According to the Association of Washington Cities Salary and Benefit Survey, the average weighted hourly wage, including benefits, for a county sheriff's deputy is \$72 an hour, and for a police officer, \$71 an hour. The average hourly cost for a prosecuting attorney, including benefits, is approximately \$134 an hour.

The average cost to investigate, prosecute, and defend a comparable gross misdemeanor charge is \$5,711, according to the Local Government Fiscal Note Program criminal justice costs model.

The Caseload Forecast Council (CFC) has no information about the expected incidence or the sentences that might be imposed. However, gross misdemeanor offenses are punishable by a term of confinement of 0-364 days in jail. Juveniles convicted of the expanded misdemeanor offenses could serve 0-30 days in local juvenile detention.

The average weighted cost for a city or county jail bed is \$145/night.
