#### II. A - Brief Description Of What The Measure Does That Has Fiscal Impact

Significant provisions of the bill and any related workload or policy assumptions that have revenue or expenditure impact on the responding agency by section number.

This bill relates to assisting refugees and immigrants by describing the role of the Office of Refugee and Immigrant Assistance (ORIA) within the Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS) in administering federal funding regarding refugee support services and authorizing DSHS ORIA to administer services to immigrants, adding a new chapter to Title 74 RCW.

Section 3 requires the department to coordinate state, federal, and local efforts to support the economic and social integration of immigrants and refugees arriving and resettling in Washington.

Section 4 designates the department as the single state agency responsible for the development, review, and administration of the Washington state plan for refugee resettlement, and requires the department to submit the state plan to and seek approval from the federal Office of Refugee Resettlement (ORR) within the federal Department of Health and Human Services (HHS) according to Title IV of the federal Immigration and Nationality Act.

Section 5 requires the department to provide refugee cash assistance, refugee medical assistance, and refugee support services in accordance with the federal act and the state plan.

Section 6 permits the department to administer services to immigrants who are ineligible for federal services, and permits the department to contract with external agencies, including community-based organizations, to provide services.

All refugee resettlement services within ORIA are currently supported by federal funding. This fiscal note relates to funding required for the expansion of services to include immigrants ineligible for federal funding, therefore all anticipated costs are 100 percent General Fund-State.

ORIA does not currently have funding to serve immigrants who are ineligible for federal services (Sec. 6). A specific appropriation would be needed in order to serve these individuals. Several indeterminate funding options are provided below to reflect the service levels that ORIA could provide, given an appropriation.

To illustrate an approximate range of services that would be able to be provided to immigrants who are ineligible for federal services, relative to the appropriation provided, ORIA estimates the potential levels of client support possible with a \$5 million General Fund-State appropriation and with a \$25 million General Fund-State appropriation.

With a General Fund-State appropriation of \$5 million, ORIA estimates the ability to provide the following supports to immigrants ineligible for federal funding:

- Establishing a single contract for Arrival and Navigation Services within King County (approximately \$1.5 million)
- Contracting with several organizations statewide to provide social services supports for immigrants, including housing

navigation (approximately \$2 million)

- Allowing social service organizations to offer short-term, limited assistance to those in need of emergency housing (approximately \$1 million)
  - Expanding state-funded employment and training programs (approximately \$500,000)

With a General Fund-State appropriation of \$25 million, ORIA estimates the ability to provide the following supports to immigrants ineligible for federal funding:

- Establishing two to three contracts for Arrival and Navigation Services statewide (approximately \$7.5 million)
- Contracting with five to ten organizations statewide to provide social services supports for immigrants, including housing navigation (approximately \$8 million)
- Allowing social service organizations to offer rental assistance and long-term housing supports to those waiting for work authorization (approximately \$7 million)
  - Expanding state-funded employment and training programs (approximately \$2.5 million)

ORIA would also require an indeterminate number of additional staff to implement these services, dependent upon the appropriation provided.

Senate bill 6245 adds a new section to Title 74 RCW. It describes the role of the Department of Social & Health Services (DSHS) and its Office of Refugee and Immigrant Assistance in administering federal funding and providing support services to refugees and immigrants.

DSHS may direct refugees to Employment Security Department's (ESD) Employment Connections program, but ESD employment services are already funded by the federal Wagner-Peyser Act. Therefore, this bill would have no fiscal impact.

Therefore, this bill would have no fiscal impact.

# Part IV: Analysis

### A. SUMMARY OF BILL

Description of the bill with an emphasis on how it impacts local government.

The legislation directs the Department of Social and Health Services (DSHS) to coordinate state, federal, and local efforts to support the economic and social integration of immigrants and refugees arriving and resettling in Washington. DSHS is designated as the single state agency responsible for the development, review, and administration of the Washington state plan for refugee resettlement.

#### B. SUMMARY OF EXPENDITURE IMPACTS

Expenditure impacts of the legislation on local governments with the expenditure provisions identified by section number and when appropriate, the detail of expenditures. Delineated between city, county and special district impacts.

The legislation would have no expenditure impacts for local governments. The bill directs DSHS to coordinate state, federal, and local efforts to support the economic and social integration of immigrants and refugees arriving and resettling in Washington. While cities and counties could be called upon to coordinate with DSHS, the Association of Washington Cities indicates this work would fall within normal operations and would not result in new costs.
