II. A - Brief Description Of What The Measure Does That Has Fiscal Impact

Significant provisions of the bill and any related workload or policy assumptions that have revenue or expenditure impact on the responding agency by section number.

The bill is about improving communication between the Department of Children, youth, and Families (DCYF) and caregivers, adding a new section to chapter 74.13 RCW.

Comparison of 1970 HB to 1970 SHB:

It deletes in Section 1 the provision in which the established communication specialist will assist caseworkers in promptly communicating with caregivers of children receiving child welfare services.

1970 SB

Section 1 states that DCYF shall establish a caregiver communication specialist to develop information sharing policies with caregivers, and coordination support between existing caregiver engagement teams, constituent relations, CW field offices and communications specialists.

Section 2 requires DCYF to submit a report by October 1, 2025 that will include how to implement an automated telephone and electronic notification system to caregivers regarding changes in child placements, court hearings and other relevant information. The report will also include any statutory, policy or funding changes and recommendations on improving communications between DCYF and caregivers.

This section provides an expiration date of April 1st, 2026.
