This measure establishes a task force from various fire service entities in addition to state agencies that represent fire service personnel. The goal of the task force is to develop policies and programs establishing a peer support counselor training program. Participation on this task force is on a limited quarterly basis; given the limited meetings there is not a fiscal impact to the agency for their attendance and participation.

The changes in the substitute version of the proposed legislation do no change our fiscal impact.

There is an indeterminate impact to Washington State Patrol (WSP).

Section 1 mandates, subject to funding, the Criminal Justice Training Commission (CJTC) to create a statewide task force to address first responder wellness including peer support services. We are a required member of this task force, starting no later than December 1, 2024 and ending on December 31, 2028.

Section 5 states that, subject to funding, the CJTC is to establish and administer a grant program to provide funding to first responders for the implementation or expansion of peer support service programs.

In RCW 5.60.060, a peer supporter shall not be compelled to testify about any communication made to the supporter during services. This privilege is extended in section 6(6)(a) to apply regardless whether the supporter and the recipient of support services are employed by the same employer or not. Furthermore, in section 6(6)(b)(v), the definition of a peer supporter under RCW 5.60.060 is extended to include a retired first responder, and authorized to provide support services not only in response to issues involved while acting in his or her official capacity, but also to deal with other stress that is impacting the peer support service recipient's performance of official duties.

Significant provisions of the bill and any related workload or policy assumptions that have revenue or expenditure impact on the responding agency by section number.

Section 1(1) states subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the commission shall convene a task force on first responder wellness in Washington state.

Section 1(6)(a) states the task force shall develop and publish model policies for first responder peer support services.

Section 2(1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the commission shall contract with an organization with expertise in peer emotional support and peer workforce development to develop and administer a 40-hour training program for first responder peer support counselors. The contracting organization must have prior experience developing peer support training for first responders in the state.

Section 2(4) states the contracting organization must complete development of the training program and begin administering it by August 1, 2025.

Section 3(1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the commission shall contract with an organization with expertise in mental health and substance use disorder counseling and treatment of first responders to develop and administer training for mental health and substance use disorder professionals to engender familiarity and cultural competency in the treatment of first responder clients.

Section 4(1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the commission shall contract with an organization that provides free and confidential crisis response and referral services for Washington state active and retired first responders and their families, to develop and maintain:

(a) A first responder peer support network, which may include individual and group support options to help first responder peer support counselors address the vicarious trauma and secondary traumatic stress incurred by performing their peer support duties;

and

(b) A directory of licensed mental health and substance use disorder professionals who have cultural competency, experience, and training with treating first responders, which must indicate whether such professionals have completed the training established under section 3 of this act.

Section 5(1) Subject to the availability of amounts appropriated for this specific purpose, the commission shall establish and administer a grant program to provide funding to first responder entities and agencies for the implementation or expansion of peer support services programs.

Section 7(10)(a) adds corrections agencies to the officer wellness grant program.

This bill relates to supporting first responder wellness and peer support.

SHB 2311 is different from HB 2311 in that:

• Section 1(2) Adds Labor & Industries (L&I) as a member of the first responder wellness task force.

This bill convenes a taskforce on first responder wellness within the Criminal Justice Training Commission (CJTC), which is to meet quarterly.

The taskforce shall evaluate and expand upon the findings presented in the DOH's Report to the Legislature 'Washington LEO Mental Health & Wellness Task Force Report, December 2021 (SSB 6570; 2020)' and make recommendations to improve first responder wellness across the first responder professions (LEO, FF, EMS, Dispatchers, Corrections) in the state.

With assistance from an organization with technical expertise in peer emotional support, the taskforce is to develop model policies to support efforts to establish and expand peer support service opportunities for first responders. Annual reports are due to the legislature beginning December 31, 2025.

Section 1(2)(e) adds one member from the Washington federation of state employees, representing the interests of the department of corrections' community corrections officers, to the task force.

Section 1(6)(a) states that the task force shall also develop and publish model policies for first responder peer support services tailored to the several types of first responder professions, including law enforcement officers, firefighters, emergency medical services frontline providers, emergency dispatchers, and corrections officers.

Section 1(6)(b) adds the task force must design the model policies to support efforts to establish and expand peer support services opportunities and networks for the professions specified under Section 1(6)(a) of this subsection, and to develop best practices and resources for peer support services from those professions.

Section 2(1) states that subject to the availability of amounts appropriated, the Washington state criminal justice training commission shall contract with an organization with expertise in peer emotional support and peer workforce development to develop and administer a 40-hour training program for first responder peer supporters. The contracting organization must have prior experience developing peer support training for first responders in the state.

Previous bill language:

House Bill 2311 relates to supporting first responder wellness and peer support amending RCW 5.60.060; amending 2023 c 475 s 218 (uncodified); adding new sections to chapter 43.101 RCW; and providing an expiration date.

Section 1(1) states, that subject to the availability of amounts appropriated, the Washington state criminal justice training commission shall convene a task force on first responder wellness in Washington state. To the extent possible, the membership of the task force should include representatives that reflect the diversity of the first responder professions, including diversity in geography, gender, sexuality, and race.

Section 1(2)(g) adds the secretary of the department of corrections, or the secretary's designee, to the task force.

Section 1(3) states that the initial meeting of the task force shall convene no later than December 1, 2024, and Section 1(4) adds at a minimum, the task force shall meet quarterly.

Section 1(7) states that beginning December 1, 2025, the task force shall submit an annual report to the legislature on the status of its work.

Section 1(8) states that Section 1 expires December 31, 2028.

Section 2(2) states that the contracting organization must engage in in-depth consultation with corrections officers when developing the training program and compensate the first responders for their consultation.

Section 3(1) states, that subject to the availability of amounts appropriated, the Washington state criminal justice training commission shall contract with an organization with expertise in mental health and substance use disorder counseling and treatment of first responders to develop and administer training for mental health and substance use disorder professionals to engender familiarity and cultural competency in the treatment of first responder clients.

Bill # 2311 S HB

Section 3(2) adds the contracting organization must consult with corrections officers when developing the training.

Section 7(10)(a) adds corrections agencies are eligible to receive state appropriation grants from the commission to establish officer wellness programs in fiscal year 2024 and fiscal year 2025.

The effective date is assumed to be 90 days after adjournment of the session in which this bill is passed.

The fiscal impact of this bill to the Department of Corrections (DOC) is indeterminate, assumed to be under \$50,000 per Fiscal Year (FY).

We assume financial impacts will result from the involvement on the task force by the secretary, or the secretary's designee, along with a representative from the Washington Federation of State Employees, representing the interests of DOC's community corrections officers. Additional financial impacts are anticipated due to the time corrections officers will spend engaging in consulting work with the contracting organization during the training development process.

The DOC cannot reasonably estimate the time and costs associated with these efforts. Therefore, DOC will "true up" our fiscal impact in subsequent budget submittals should the legislation be enacted into session law.

II. A - Brief Description Of What The Measure Does That Has Fiscal Impact

Significant provisions of the bill and any related workload or policy assumptions that have revenue or expenditure impact on the responding agency by section number.

Substitute House Bill 2311 relates to first responder wellness and peer support. Section 1 would impact the University of Washington (UW). Subject to the availability of funds, it requires the Criminal Justice Training Commission to convene a task force on first responder wellness in Washington state. One member of the task force must be from UW Medicine's Department of Psychiatry and Behavioral Sciences and be someone who has implemented a regional state-funded law enforcement officer wellness program.

This is the first version of this bill that the UW has been asked to evaluate. Several hours per month of the specified faculty member's time will likely be required to prepare for and attend task force meetings. However, any related costs should be relatively minimal and can be absorbed using existing resources. Therefore, there is no fiscal impact from SHB 2311.

A. SUMMARY OF BILL

Description of the bill with an emphasis on how it impacts local government.

CHANGES BETWEEN THIS VERSION AND PREVIOUS BILL VERSION:

Changed "Peer support counselor" to "Peer supporter" and "Peer support counselors/counseling" to "Peer support services" because legislators needed to clarify the peer support servicers being provided are non-clinical.

SUMMARY OF CURRENT BILL:

Sec. 1 (Adds new section to RCW 43.101):

- (2) (a) Requires the first responder wellness task force to consist of two members of :
- (i) Law enforcement officers;
- (ii) Firefighters;
- (iii) Emergency medical services frontline providers;
- (iv) Emergency dispatcher;
- (v) Corrections officers.
- (6) (a) Requires the task force to develop and public model policies for first responder peer support services for the following first responder professions:
- (i) Law enforcement officers;
- (ii) Firefighters;
- (iii) Emergency medical services frontline providers;
- (iv) Emergency dispatcher;
- (v) Corrections officers.
- (6) (d) The task force must publish the model policies by December 31, 2025.

Sec. 2 (Adds new section to RCW 43.101):

- (1) Requires the commission to contract with an organization with expertise in peer emotional support and peer workforce development to develop and administer a 40-hour training program for first responder peer supporters.
- (2) The contracting organization must consultation with law enforcement officers, corrections officers, firefighters, emergency services dispatchers or record-keepers, and emergency medical personnel when developing the training program. They must also compensate first responders for their consultation.
- (3) A portion of the training program's curriculum must be relevant to all first responder professions and specifically curated to address the unique needs of each first responder profession.
- (4) The contracting organization must complete development of the training program and begin administering it by August 1, 2025.
- (5) The contracting organization must utilize current or retired first responders as co-trainers to deliver the training program.

Sec. 5 (Adds new section to RCW 43.101):

- (1) Requires the commission to establish and administer a grant program to provide funding to first responder entities and agencies for the implementation or expansion of peer support services programs.
- (2) Outlines requirements for first responder entity or agency that receives funding through the grant program:
- (a) Must ensure every peer supporter designated by the entity or agency enrolls in and completes the 40-hour training program;
- (b) Must compensate every peer supporter or designated by the entity or agency for their services in that role;
- (c) Must provide information to every peer supporter designated by the entity or agency about the first responder peer

Sec. 6 (Amends RCW 5.60.060):

(6) (a) Adds language which requires peer supporters not to be compelled to testify about any communication made to the supporter by the peer support client without the consent of the client. This privilege applies whether the peer support client is an employee of the same agency as the peer supporter.

Sec. 7 (Amends 2023 c 475 s 218)

(10) (a) Adds language which extends the grant for establishing officer wellness programs to corrections agencies.

CHANGES IN EXPENDITURE IMPACTS BETWEEN THIS VERSION AND PREVIOUS BILL VERSION:

There were no changes made between versions that would change the expenditure impact of the bill.

EXPENDITURE IMPACTS OF CURRENT BILL:

This legislation would have an indeterminate expenditure impact on local governments.

There is not enough available data to estimate the cost for first responder agencies to cover the optional 40-hour peer supporter training. The cost of the 40-hour peer supporter training and peer supporter compensation is unknown for all qualified first responders. However, the Local Government Fiscal Note Program Unit Cost model estimates that a 40-hour training, without travel or lodging expenses, would cost first responder agencies at the city level roughly \$2,477 per firefighter and \$2,511 per police officer. Travel and lodging costs were not included because it's unknown if the peer supporter training will require travel. The cost for agencies to cover peer supporter training for emergency medical services frontline providers, emergency dispatchers, and corrections officers is indeterminate because they are not included in the Local Government Fiscal Note Program Unit Cost model.

Additionally, the cost for first responder agencies to compensation their trained supporter is unknown and could be covered by fund awarded to the agency through the first responder peer support supporter grant.

CHANGES IN REVENUE IMPACTS BETWEEN THIS VERSION AND PREVIOUS BILL VERSION:

There were not changes between versions that would change the revenue impact of the bill.

REVENUE IMPACTS OF CURRENT BILL:

This legislation would have an indeterminate revenue impact on local governments.

The bill would have an indeterminate impact on local government revenue because the amount that would be awarded to local government by the first responder peer support supporter grant is unknown. Local governments also have the option to apply for the first responder peer supporter grant.
