Part II: Narrative Explanation

II. A - Brief Description Of What The Measure Does That Has Fiscal Impact

Significant provisions of the bill and any related workload or policy assumptions that have revenue or expenditure impact on the responding agency by section number.

This bill creates a new chapter in Title 18 RCW (Businesses and Professions) for anesthesiologist assistants.

Sections 2: Directs the commission to adopt rules fixing the qualifications and the educational and training requirements for licensure as an anesthesiologist assistant. The commission will also adopt rules related to examination requirements, duties, responsibilities, protections, discipline, and limitations.

Section 3: Directs the commission to adopt rules establishing the requirements and limitations on the practice by and supervision of anesthesiologist assistants, including the number of anesthesiologist assistants an anesthesiologist may supervise concurrently.

Section 4, 5, 6 & 7: Outlines the scope of authority for an anesthesiologist assistant and supervising anesthesiologists.

Section 8: Amends 18.130.040 RCW (Application to certain professions—Authority of secretary—Grant or denial of licenses—Procedural rules.) adding a new chapter created in section 10 of this act to the Washington medical commission.

Section 9: Amends RCW 18.120.020 (Definitions) adding anesthesiologist assistants licensed under chapter to the list of health professions licensed under chapter 18 RCW.

Section 10: States sections 1 through 7 of this act constitutes a new chapter in Title 18 RCW.

II. B - Cash receipts Impact

Current law, RCW 43.70.250 (License fees for professions, occupations, and businesses.), requires the commission to charge a fee to generate sufficient revenue to fully support the costs of administering its health profession licensing activities.

Sections 2-7: For the purpose of this fiscal note, a one-year certification fee is estimated at \$505 to cover the regulation of Anesthesiologist Assistants. During the rulemaking process, a fee study will be prepared with proposed fees and provided for stakeholder input. The commission will monitor the program fund balance and adjust fees over a six (6) year period to ensure that fees are sufficient to cover all program expenditures.

Revenue collection will start July 1, 2026, and renewals paid each year thereafter. Based on the number of schools currently providing this training (11-15), the commission anticipates there will be 40 applications in the first year and 20 applications each year thereafter. The commission further assumes a 100% renewal rate due to its specialized training.

Rulemaking

Sections 2,3,8-10: This bill requires the WMC to establish and adopt rules to create a new credential for Anesthesiology Assistants. The commission expects this to be an 18-month rulemaking effort in order to increase collaboration and stakeholder participation with the Health Care Authority (HCA), the Washington Board of Nursing (WABON), other stakeholders, and the community. Rulemaking will include six public meetings as well as one formal hearing. Costs include staff, associated expenses (including goods and services, travel, intra-agency, and indirect charges), and Office of the Attorney General support in the amount of \$9,000.

FY 2025; 0.5 FTE and \$78,000 (02G) FY 2026; 0.2 FTE and \$33,000 (02G)

Office of Information Technology (OIT)

Sections 2: OIT staff and vendor time will be required to make a new application and create a new credential in the Healthcare Enforcement and Licensing Modernization Solution (HELMS) for Anesthesiologist Assistants. Configuration in HELMS, in FY 2025, will require approximately 216 additional hours from the integration vendor at a rate of \$270 per hour

FY 2025; 0.1 FTE and \$84,000 (02G) FY 2026 and ongoing; 0.1 FTE and \$10,000 (02G)

Office of Customer Service (OCS)

Sections 2-3: OCS staff will create new certification credentials to be issued for the new Anesthesiologist Assistant credential. This includes developing new paper and online application forms, configuration, testing, implementation, training, and updates for the new credential type. Additionally, this new credential will generate additional calls to the call center for assistance, increase the number of background checks, payments, and renewals processed.

FY 2025 and ongoing; 0.1 FTE and \$7,000 (02G)

Discipline

Sections 2-7: Based on the commission's review of national association certificate program education requirements and on the assumption that the Washington Medical Commission would adopt training and education requirements similar to the national association standards, the department assumes a discipline rate similar to other credentials (such as the Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist). With these assumptions, the department estimates 5 complaints per year.
