## Part II: Narrative Explanation

#### II. A - Brief Description Of What The Measure Does That Has Fiscal Impact

Significant provisions of the bill and any related workload or policy assumptions that have revenue or expenditure impact on the responding agency by section number.

- Section 1: New Section. Legislative findings.
- Section 2: New Section. Allows for creation of a cannabis consumption event organizer license. Provides additional authority and restrictions regarding that license. Provides requirements regarding consumption areas where licensee can operate. Gives the Liquor and Cannabis Board (LCB) authority over licensees and provides additional requirements regarding administration of the licenses.
- Section 3: New Section. Requires cannabis consumption event organizer employees to obtain budtender permits. Provides requirements for budtender permits and training programs along with suspension and revocation authority to the LCB.
- Section 4: New Section. Provides list of events that do not constitute criminal or civil offenses if performed by licensees under this act.
- Section 5: Amends RCW 69.50.328 to prohibit licensed cannabis producers, processors, and retailers from having financial interests in a cannabis consumption event organizer. Allows participation in certain events.
- Section 6: Amends RCW 69.50.345 to add cannabis consumption event organizers to the requirements of that statute. Gives LCB rulemaking authority to implement the provisions of this bill, including the licensing and regulation of cannabis consumption event organizers.
- Section 7: Amends RCW 69.50.342 to make language changes consistent with other provisions of this bill, adding provisions applicable to single-use cannabis products and ready-to-consume cannabis products.
- Section 8: Amends RCW 69.50.331 to make language changes consistent with other provisions of this bill.
- Section 9: Amends RCW 69.50.325 to make language changes consistent with other provisions of this bill.
- Section 10: Amends RCW 69.50.346 regarding labeling of cannabis product packages sold at events under this bill.
- Section 11: Amends RCW 69.50.335 to make language changes consistent with other provisions of this bill.
- Section 12: Amends RCW 69.50.354 to clarify that section does not apply to licensed cannabis consumption event organizers.

#### II. B - Cash receipts Impact

Cash receipts impact of the legislation on the responding agency with the cash receipts provisions identified by section number and when appropriate, the detail of the revenue sources. Cash receipts are assumed to equal the Legal Services Revolving Account (LSRA) cost estimates. These will be billed through the revolving account to the client agency.

The client agency is the Liquor and Cannabis Board (LCB). The Attorney General's Office (AGO) will bill all clients for legal services rendered.

These cash receipts represent the AGO's authority to bill and are not a direct appropriation to the AGO. The direct appropriation is reflected in the client agency's fiscal note. Appropriation authority is necessary in the AGO budget.

#### AGO AGENCY ASSUMPTIONS:

LCB will be billed for non-King County rates:

FY 2026: \$358,000 for 1.1 Assistant Attorney General FTE (AAG), 0.3 Paralegal 2 FTE (PL2), and 0.6 Paralegal 1 FTE (PL1)

FY 2027: \$418,000 for 1.3 AAG, 0.3 PL2, and 0.7 PL1

FY 2028: \$350,000 for 1.1 AAG, 0.3 PL2, and 0.6 PL1

FY 2029 and in each FY thereafter: \$326,000 for 1.1 AAG, 0.3 PL2, and 0.6 PL1

#### II. C - Expenditures

Agency expenditures necessary to implement this legislation (or savings resulting from this legislation), with the provisions of the legislation that result in the expenditures (or savings) identified by section number. Description of the factual basis of the assumptions and the method by which the expenditure impact is derived. Explanation of how workload assumptions translate into cost estimates. Distinguished between one time and ongoing functions.

Attorney General's Office (AGO) Agency Assumptions:

Legal services associated with the enactment of this bill will begin on July 1, 2025 (FY 2026).

Location of staffing is assumed to be in a non-King County office building.

Total workload impact in this request includes standard assumption costs for goods & services, travel, and capital outlays for all FTE identified.

Agency administration support FTE are included in the tables. The Management Analyst 5 FTE (MA) is used as a representative classification. An example ratio is for every 1.0 Assistant Attorney General FTE (AAG), the AGO includes 0.5 Paralegal 1 FTE (PL1) and 0.4 MA.

1. Assumptions for the AGO Government Compliance & Enforcement Division (GCE) legal services for the Liquor and Cannabis Board (LCB):

GCE litigates licensing and enforcement actions for LCB. GCE would bill the LCB for legal services based on the enactment of this bill. HB 1932 would create a new cannabis consumption event organizer license. It would also establish certain license restrictions, provide requirements for the locations at which licensees could operate, and give LCB regulatory authority over the licenses. Additionally, it would require all employees working at a cannabis consumption event to obtain a budtender permit and would give the LCB regulatory authority over the permits. LCB would have authority to engage in rulemaking to implement the provisions of this bill. LCB assumes that extensive rulemaking would be required by this bill. Although GCE anticipates the AGO Licensing & Administrative Law Division (LAL) would provide most of the rulemaking advice to LCB, GCE assumes to be asked to review and provide comments on the new rule proposals resulting from this bill. GCE further assumes that rulemaking advice would generate 40 AAG hours of new work in FY 2026, 10 AAG hours in FY 2027, and five AAG hours in FY 2028. LCB also assumes that the licensing process would result in 10 new licensing cases each year beginning in FY 2026. Additionally, LCB assumes the new cannabis consumption event organizer licenses and budtender permits would result in 400 new enforcement actions each year in FY 2026 and FY 2027. LCB assumes that as the new licensees and permit holders become familiar with the new law, LCB would see a reduction in enforcement actions. In each of FY 2026 and FY 2027, LCB assumes to forward a total of 44 new cases to GCE for administrative litigation. Beginning in FY 2028, LCB assumes the number of new cases forwarded to GCE would drop to 35 cases each year. GCE assumes to utilize an average of 35 AAG hours to litigate each case, and that GCE would utilize Paralegal 2 FTE (PL2) services for this new work at a ratio of one PL2 hour for three AAG hours, for a total annual impact of 1,540 AAG hours (44 x 35) and 484 PL2 hours (44 x 11) in FY 2026 and FY 2027, and 1,225 AAG hours (35 x 35) and 385 PL hours (35 x 11) in FY 2028 and continuing each year thereafter. GCE further assumes to receive three new judicial review cases each year, beginning in FY 2027. GCE also assumes these judicial reviews would be certified to the Court of Appeals (COA). Because of the more stringent requirements for litigation before the COA, GCE assumes each judicial review would utilize an average of 120 AAG hours, for total of 360 AAG hours (3 x 120) of new work in FY 2027 and each year thereafter.

As a result of this bill, GCE would see the following total workload increases in hours:

FY 2026: 1,580 AAG hours (40 + 1,540) and 484 PL2 hours

FY 2027: 1,910 AAG hours (10 + 1,540 + 360) and 484 PL2 hours

FY 2028: 1,590 AAG hours (5 + 1,225 + 360) and 385 PL2 hours

FY 2029 and in each FY thereafter: 1,585 AAG hours (1,225+360) and 385 PL2 hours

GCE: Total non-King County workload impact:

FY 2026: \$294,000 for 0.9 AAG, 0.3 PL2, and 0.4 PL1

FY 2027: \$348,000 for 1.1 AAG, 0.3 PL2, and 0.5 PL1

FY 2028 and each FY thereafter: \$286,000 for 0.9 AAG, 0.2 PL2, and 0.4 PL1

2. Assumptions for the AGO LAL Division legal services for LCB:

LAL will bill LCB for legal services based on the enactment of this bill. LAL advises LCB on rulemaking, contracting, and

other requirements related to implementation. This bill imposes significant rulemaking requirements on LCB, including rulemaking regarding the creation of a new "cannabis consumption event organizer license" and all requirements related to that new license, its interactions with existing licensees, and safety requirements related to consumption events, storage and transportation of cannabis, and collection of taxes. Other topics of rulemaking will be the creation of new product types and requirements, collection of taxes by other licensees, new permissions granted to existing licensees, and the creation and implementation of new "budtender permits," and their interaction with existing statutory requirements. LAL will also advise LCB on any contracting requirements related to implementation. LAL projects it will provide 400 AAG hours of advice on rulemaking, contracting, and other implementation of this bill in FY 2026. LAL will provide 100 AAG hours of advice on implementation in FY 2027 and 50 AAG hours in FY 2028. LAL also advises LCB on final orders of administrative regulatory actions. LCB projects that there will be approximately 400 additional enforcement actions that proceed to hearing in the first year of issuing these licenses, which is projected as FY 2027. These enforcement actions are estimated at 200 actions against budtender permits and 200 actions against licensees, given the concurrent and joint liability for violations between budtenders, event licensees and other licensees. Based on historical analogues LCB projects that five percent of budtender violations will appeal and 12 percent of licensee violations appeal, resulting in 34 enforcement appeal actions in the first year. This is projected to decrease over time based on familiarity with the new permit and license requirements. Additionally, LCB projects 10 licensing actions each year. In FY 2027, LCB projects 44 total appeals. This will decrease to 35 total appeals in FY 2029. LAL projects a default rate of 25 percent on all appeals. Each of the licensing and enforcement action that do not resolve on default will require 10 AAG hours to advise LCB. Defaults will require one AAG hour. LAL projects 11 defaults each year and 33 completed actions in FY 2027 and 2028 and nine defaults and 24 completed actions each subsequent FY.

As a result of this bill, LAL would see the following total workload increases in hours:

FY 2026: 400 AAG hours FY 2027: 440 AAG hours FY 2028: 390 AAG hours

FY 2029 and in each FY thereafter: 250 AAG hours

LAL: Total non-King County workload impact: FY 2026: \$64,000 for 0.2 AAG and 0.1 PL1 FY 2027: \$70,000 for 0.2 AAG and 0.1 PL1 FY 2028: \$64,000 for 0.2 AAG and 0.1 PL1

FY 2029 and each FY thereafter: \$40,000 for 0.1 AAG and 0.1 PL1

- 3. The AGO Revenue Division (REV) has reviewed this bill and determined it will not increase or decrease the division's workload in representing the Caseload Forecast Council (CFC). REV does not anticipate CFC will need additional legal services if this bill becomes enacted. Therefore, no costs are included in this request.
- 4. The AGO Solicitor General's Office Division (SGO) has reviewed this bill and determined it will not increase or decrease the division's legal advice or litigation workload. Therefore, no costs are included in this request.
- 5. The AGO Agriculture & Health Division (AHD) has reviewed this bill and determined it will not increase or decrease the division's workload in representing the Department of Commerce (Commerce) or the Department of Health (DOH). Commerce was assigned this fiscal note request for its role in estimating the impact of bills on local governments. Commerce itself would not be given any new authorities or responsibilities under this bill. This will not generate any legal work for AHD. DOH legal advice would be minimal. New legal services are nominal, and costs are not included in this request.

## 101 – Caseload Forecast Council February 10, 2025

#### **SUMMARY**

#### A brief description of what the measure does that has fiscal impact.

Section 21 Amends RCW 69.50.475 (Cannabis retail outlets—Sale to persons under the age of twenty-one—Penalty) by expanding the definition of a gross misdemeanor offense to include employees of a cannabis consumption event organizer.

#### **Impact Summary**

This bill:

#### Impact on prison and jail beds

This bill expands the definition of a gross misdemeanor offense. The Caseload Forecast Council (CFC) does not collect data on gross misdemeanor offenses, and, therefore, cannot reliably estimate bed impacts resulting from the bill.

However, as gross misdemeanor offenses are punishable by a term of confinement of 0-364 days in jail, any impact should manifest itself as an increased need for jail beds only.

#### Impact on local detention and Juvenile Rehabilitation beds

No impact. The bill expands the definition of a gross misdemeanor offense, however, the offense is associated with a cannabis consumption event organizer license who employee sells to someone under the age of 21, and as such, it is assumed there would be no one under the age of 18 committing this violation.

Section 1 creates legal environments where adult consumers may purchase and consume cannabis products on-site in designated areas.

Section 2 creates a Cannabis Consumption Event Organizer License and outlines the requirements and limitations to maintain that license. Violations of those requirements are appealable to the Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH).

Section 3(1)(a) requires workers at the consumption events to obtain a budtender permit and undergo training to obtain the permit.

Section 3(2)(a) & (b) permits the Liquor & Cannabis Board (LCB) to suspend or revoke a budtender permit. These would also be appealable to OAH.

Section 6(14) outlines the minimum requirements LCB must establish for a Cannabis Consumption Event Coordinator.

As a central service agency, the Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH) bills referring agencies for its costs and collects the revenue into the Administrative Hearings Revolving Account. Cash receipts are assumed to equal costs. OAH will bill the Liquor & Cannabis Board for the costs related to this proposed legislation.

These cash receipts represent the OAH's authority to bill and are not a direct appropriation to OAH. Appropriation authority is necessary in OAH's budget.

The Liquor & Cannabis Board estimates that the proposed legislation will result in five new appeals being referred to the Office of Administrative Hearings (OAH) per fiscal year beginning in FY 2026. On average, each appeal is expected to take approximately 18 hours of Line Administrative Law Judge (ALJ) time including prehearing conferences, hearings, order writings, etc.

OAH Agency Workforce Assumptions:

- (1) 1.0 Line ALJ will include cost and FTE for 0.15 Senior ALJ (SALJ), 0.15 Lead ALJ (LALJ), 0.6 Legal Assistant 2 (LA2) (Range 40 step L), and 0.25 administrative support represented as a Management Analyst 5 (MA5) (Range 64 Step L).
- (2) ALJ salary is based on the ALJ collective bargaining agreement and assumed to be at step L. (Line ALJ-range 70, Senior ALJ-range 76, Lead ALJ-range 73).
- (3) Benefit rates were analyzed by job class and projected using the latest benefit information available.
- (4) Goods and services, travel and on-going capital outlays were projected based on historical data for each of the job classifications.
- (5) Salary projections are based on the current FY 2025 salary tables.

Total workload impact beginning in FY 2026 is 0.06 ALJ at a rounded cost of \$20,000 per FY.

This bill is assumed effective 90 days after the end of the 2025 legislative session.

#### INTENT:

NEW SECTION. Sec. 1. The legislature finds that by creating a cannabis event organizer license as a new license type to conduct a limited number of events each year, subject to statutory and regulatory requirements, local government ordinances, and regulation by the liquor and cannabis board, Washington can follow the lead of other states that have successfully legalized cannabis consumption events or activities and entrusted their citizens to partake responsibly.

#### NEW SECTION. Sec. 2. A new section is added to chapter 69.50 RCW to read as follows:

- (1) There is a cannabis consumption event organizer license available to a person or entity that does not hold a cannabis license under this chapter. The license authorizes the holder to organize and conduct consumption events at specified locations on specified dates and times approved by the board at which adults age 21 and over may purchase single-use cannabis products and ready-to-consume cannabis products from the licensed cannabis consumption event organizer or from participating cannabis producers, processors, and retailers, and consume single-use cannabis products and ready-to-consume cannabis products in approved consumption areas by smoking, vaporization, consumption, or ingestion, subject to the requirements and limitations in this section.
- A maximum of one event per calendar month may be conducted under the cannabis consumption event organizer license, with each event lasting a maximum of three consecutive days, except that two years after the effective date of this section, the board, by rule, may increase the maximum number of events per calendar month and the maximum duration of each individual event.
- Every cannabis consumption event organizer license must be issued in the name of the applicant, must specify the location of the cannabis consumption event organizer's principal location where the licensee will operate, which must be within the state of Washington, and the holder thereof may not allow any other person to use the license.
  - The application fee is \$500. Annual license renewal is \$200.
  - An event permit is required as provided in subsection (5) of this section.
- No licensed cannabis consumption event organizer or its employees may perform work involving sale or service of single-use cannabis products, or preparation, sale, or service of ready-to-consume cannabis products to the public unless the individual conducting the activity holds a valid budtender permit as provided in section 3 of this act.

#### (2)(a) A licensed cannabis consumption event organizer may:

- (i) Obtain, from a cannabis processor licensed under this chapter, or a cannabis processor operating consistent with a tribal-state cannabis agreement under RCW 43.06.490, single-use cannabis products for the purposes of resale and cannabis products approved by the board for preparation of ready-to-consume cannabis products for sale at retail at an approved consumption event;
- (ii) Obtain, from a cannabis producer licensed under this chapter, or a cannabis producer operating consistent with a tribal-state cannabis agreement under RCW 43.06.490, cannabis for the preparation of ready-to-consume cannabis products for sale at retail at an approved consumption event;
- (iii) Sell single-use cannabis products at retail to adults age 21 and over at the premises of an approved consumption event;
- (iv) Prepare ready-to-consume cannabis products using cannabis and cannabis products and sell ready-to-consume cannabis products at retail to adults age 21 and over at the premises of an approved consumption event;
- (v) Sell noncannabis food and beverages to customers of a consumption event approved under this section;
- (vi) Sell any other item that does not contain cannabis or cannabis products and is not intended for use with cannabis or cannabis products to customers of the cannabis consumption event; and
- (vii) Provide live entertainment at the cannabis consumption event.
  - (b) The sale of alcohol, cigarettes, tobacco products, and vapor products, other than vapor products that are cannabis

products, is prohibited by a licensee under this section.

- (3) Consumption areas may be indoors subject to the limitations in this section on methods of consumption, or consumption areas may be outdoors. All sales and use, consumption, smoking, vaporization, and ingestion of cannabis products authorized for sale and consumption under this section must be out of the view of public places other than public places authorized for conducting the consumption event.
- (a)(i) Except as provided in (a)(ii) of this subsection (3), in an indoor consumption area approved by the board, the consumption or ingestion of single-use cannabis products and ready-to-consume cannabis products is permitted, but smoking or vaporizing single-use cannabis products and any other cannabis product is prohibited.
- (b) In an outdoor consumption area approved by the board, the consumption of single-use cannabis products is permitted by consumption, ingestion, smoking, and vaporization, and the consumption of ready-to-consume cannabis products is permitted by consumption and ingestion.
- (c) A licensee, and any participating licensed cannabis producer, processor, or retailer, must make available personal protective equipment including masks and gloves and have procedures that ensure employees are reasonably protected from secondhand smoke, vapor, or other workplace safety concerns.
- (5) A cannabis consumption event organizer licensee is subject to the requirements in this subsection and the board's rules.
- (a) The licensee must have a temporary on-site consumption event permit issued by the board in advance of each consumption event and include in any application for the approval of a temporary on-site consumption event permit the location or address of the consumption event, a list of cannabis producers, processors, and retailers participating in the consumption event, and a diagram identifying the consumption event's premises, including designated areas for retail sales, consumption areas, and storage of cannabis products. The board may by rule establish the fee for a temporary on-site consumption event permit under this subsection, provided the fee may not exceed \$500 per event. The event fee under this subsection (5)(a) for a licensee who obtained a license through the cannabis social equity program is waived through July 1, 2032.
  - (c) The licensee must demonstrate to the board that the licensee obtained any required local permit or approval.
- (d) The licensee must separate consumption areas from retail sales areas and other areas of the consumption event's premises.
- (e) The licensee must ensure that use, consumption, ingestion, smoking, or vaporization of cannabis products is not visible from any public place that is not authorized for the event.
- (f) The licensee must warehouse cannabis and single-use cannabis products at its principal place of business. If the licensee chooses to warehouse such products, the licensee may temporarily store these products at a consumption event for the purposes of sale to adults age 21 and over and making ready-to-consume cannabis products. The product must be in a locked storage compartment or container approved by the board and all remaining product must be returned back to the warehouse at the end of each day of the consumption event. Nothing in this section requires a licensee to possess or warehouse cannabis products or sell cannabis products directly to consumers. Licensees may choose to organize consumption events at which the sale of cannabis products is conducted only by participating cannabis producers, processors, and retailers.
- (g) The licensee must designate a limited access area or areas that can only be accessed by the licensee, participating cannabis producers, processors, retailers, designated staff of such licensees, and the board.
- (h) A licensee, and any participating producer, processor, or retailer, must train each employee concerning paraphernalia, single-use cannabis products, and ready-to-consume cannabis products including, without limitation, the proper use of paraphernalia, the potency, absorption time, and effects of single-use cannabis products and ready-to-consume cannabis products, the recognition of impairment from and overconsumption of cannabis, and the safe handling of a customer who is impaired. The training in this subsection is in addition to budtender permit requirements in section 3 of this act.
- (i) The licensee must submit a security plan to the board that, without limitation, provides for adequate security and lighting at the consumption event and for each entrance and exit of the consumption event to be adequately secured, and submit to the board such updates to the plan as the board may require.
  - (i) The licensee must submit a plan to the board setting forth protocols and procedures to deter customers from

driving under the influence of cannabis and submit to the board such updates to the plan as the board may require.

- (k) The licensee must submit a plan to the board setting forth protocols and procedures to ensure that cannabis and cannabis products are not sold or otherwise distributed at a consumption event other than as authorized in this section and submit to the board such updates to the plan as the board may require.
- (l) Licensees must dispose of cannabis or cannabis products that are left at a consumption area in accordance with the procedures for disposal set forth by the rules of the board.
  - (m) The licensee must post conspicuous notices at the point of sale with:
- (i) The same information required to be posted by cannabis retailers under RCW 69.50.357(5), which the department of health shall make available to licensees and licensed cannabis producers, processors, or retailers participating in consumption events; and
- (ii) Information about the possible harmful impacts of cannabis consumption, risks of dependence or substance use disorder related to cannabis, and contact information to prevention, treatment, or support services.
  - (o) The licensee shall not employ persons under age 21.
  - (p) The licensee must comply with all local ordinances.
  - (q) The licensee must comply with any requirements in the rules of the board.
- (6) A licensed cannabis consumption event organizer is not considered to be a cannabis retailer under this chapter, but may sell cannabis products directly to consumers for consumption at an approved consumption event in a consumption area. A licensed cannabis consumption event organizer shall collect and remit the cannabis excise tax in RCW 69.50.540.
- (7)(a) Except as provided in (b) of this subsection, the board may not issue more than one cannabis consumption event organizer license under this section to any one person.
- (b) The board may approve a transfer of a cannabis consumption event organizer license to a person who is approved to acquire a 100 percent ownership interest in a cannabis consumption event organizer, if the transfer complies with requirements of the board and will not result in the person holding more than two cannabis consumption event organizer licenses.
- (8) For the purposes of this section, "public place" has the meaning provided in RCW 66.04.010, but the exclusions in RCW 66.04.011 do not apply.

#### NEW SECTION. Sec. 3. A new section is added to chapter 69.50 RCW to read as follows:

(1)(a) For employees of a cannabis consumption event organizer licensed under section 2 of this act, or employees of licensed cannabis producers, processors, or retailers authorized to participate in a consumption event under section 2 of this act, who perform work involving sale or service of single-use cannabis products to the public, or preparation, sale, or service of ready-to-consume cannabis products to the public, the employee must obtain a valid budtender permit before conducting such activities and working at a consumption event.

#### Sec. 5. RCW 69.50.328 is amended to read as follows:

(2) A licensed cannabis producer, processor, or retailer may participate at a consumption event conducted by a licensed cannabis consumption event organizer and approved by the board.

#### Sec. 26. RCW 69.50.101 is each amended to read as follows:

- (6) "Cannabis consumption event organizer" means a type of license under which an individual or entity may coordinate consumption events for the consumption of single-use cannabis products and ready-to-consume cannabis products by adults age 21 and over, after obtaining a temporary on-site consumption permit from the board for each consumption event.
- (16) "Consumption area" means a space authorized under section 2 of this act and approved by the board at a location under the cannabis consumption event organizer license, where persons age 21 and over may consume single-use cannabis products and ready-to-consume cannabis products by methods of consumption approved for the type of space as provided in section 2 of this act.
  - (17) "Consumption event" means a temporary event, not to exceed one event per calendar month lasting up to three

consecutive days except as provided in section 2 of this act, that a cannabis consumption event organizer organizes and operates, which may include participation by cannabis producers, processors, and retailers licensed under this chapter or operating consistent with a compact entered into under RCW 43.06.490, after the cannabis consumption event organizer obtains a temporary on-site consumption permit from the board.

- (47) "Ready-to-consume cannabis product" means a cannabis product that is prepared on the premises of a licensed cannabis consumption event organizer or an approved consumption event, presented in the form of a foodstuff or beverage, sold in a heated or unheated state, intended for immediate consumption, and that the board has determined to be an appropriate product for consumption at a consumption event.
- (51) "Single-use cannabis product" means a type of product containing cannabis, other than a ready-to-consume cannabis product, that the board has determined to be appropriate for consumption in a cannabis consumption area under section 2 of this act. A single-use cannabis product may be a form of useable cannabis, cannabis-infused product in solid or liquid form, or cannabis concentrate, that is smoked, vaporized, consumed, or ingested.
- (54) "Temporary on-site consumption permit" means an official authorization documented by the board for a cannabis consumption event organizer to host a consumption event.
- (59) "Warehouse" means an indoor structure or a portion of the structure on a cannabis consumption event organizer's premises at its principal place of business used for the onsite storage of cannabis and single-use cannabis products in compliance with the requirements of the board, including for security, storage, and disposal.

Section 2(1) creates a new cannabis consumption event organizer license which authorizes the holder to organize and conduct consumption events at specified locations on specified dates and times approved by the board at which adults age 21 and over may purchase single-use cannabis products and ready-to-consume cannabis products. The application fee is \$500. Annual license renewal is \$200.

The agency estimates 500 new cannabis consumption event organizer licenses. Application fee (assumes all in FY26) -  $$500 \times 500 = $250,000$ Annual fee -  $$200 \times 500 = $100,000 \text{ per year.}$ 

\*\*\*

Section 2(5) The licensee must have a temporary on-site consumption event permit issued by the board in advance of each consumption event. The board may by rule establish the fee for a temporary on-site consumption event permit under this subsection, provided the fee may not exceed \$500 per event. The event fee under this subsection (5)(a) for a licensee who obtained a license through the cannabis social equity program is waived through July 1, 2032.

Because this fee is not specified in the bill but may be established by rule, the estimate for this portion is INDETERMINATE.

\*\*\*\*

Section 2(6) A licensed cannabis consumption event organizer shall collect and remit the cannabis excise tax in RCW 69.50.

It is unknown what portion of sales would be shifting from existing retail activity versus new sales, and the popularity of these events is unknown and thus the potential revenue, the estimate for this portion is INDETERMINATE.

\*\*\*\*

Section 3(1a) For employees of a cannabis consumption event organizer licensed under section 2 of this act, or employees

of licensed cannabis producers, processors, or retailers authorized to participate in a consumption event under section 2 of this act, who perform work involving sale or service of single-use cannabis products to the public, or preparation, sale, or service of ready-to-consume cannabis products to the public, the employee must obtain a valid budtender permit before conducting such activities and working at a consumption event. The board must establish the elements of a budtender permit program, including permit fees, by rule.

Because this fee is not specified in the bill but may be established by rule, the estimate for this portion is INDETERMINATE.

#### **BOARD DIVISION:**

#### Central Service Costs:

- The Attorney General's Office anticipates billing the Board for legal costs associated with this bill:

FY26: \$358,000 FY27: \$418,000 FY28: \$350,000 FY29+: \$326,000

- The Office of Administrative Hearings anticipates billing the Board for legal costs associated with this bill: \$20,000/year.

#### Project costs:

The Washington State Liquor and Cannabis Board ("Board") is currently in the middle of a project to upgrade the agency's internal licensing and enforcement systems. The Licensing, Enforcement, Education, and Administrative Data Systems (LEEADS) is expected to go live in FY 2025. There are change request costs associated with this legislation that will have to be submitted to the vendor or contracted out by the LCB. The estimated costs for these change requests is \$328,266 in FY26. Some examples of changes needed follow:

Vendor cost to implement: \$140,650 (\$108,192 plus 30%) Salesforce Developer: 448 hrs x \$392/hr = \$175,616 Salesforce Business Analyst: 80 hrs x \$150/hr = \$12,000

The addition of 500 more licensees will require more staff in the Cannabis Tax Unit to process tax receipts.

1.0 FTE Fiscal Analyst 3 - \$105,069/yr (\$98,139 salary/benefits, \$6,930 in associated costs). Onetime costs in FY26 of \$6,305 for equipment purchases.

2.0 FTE Fiscal Analyst 2 - \$187,260/yr (\$173,400 salary/benefits, \$13,860 in associated costs). Onetime costs in FY26 of \$12,610 for equipment purchases.

More audits would need to be performed with the addition of 500 more licensees.

3.0 FTE Revenue Auditor 3 - \$407,046/yr (\$341,496 salary/benefits, \$65,550 in associated costs). Onetime costs in FY26 of \$8,475 for equipment purchases.

- 12.0 FTE Licensing Specialist Senior \$1,125,924/yr (\$1,061,364 salary/benefits, \$64,560 in associated costs). Onetime costs in FY26 of \$75,660 for equipment purchases.
- 0.1 FTE Customer Service Specialist 3 \$8,364/yr (\$7,826 salary/benefits, \$538 in associated costs).
- 1.0 FTE Office Assistant 3 \$62,039/yr (\$56,659 salary/benefits, \$5,380 in associated costs). Onetime costs in FY26 of \$6,305 for equipment purchases.

#### Assumptions:

The agency anticipates that 50 percent of licensed producers (79), processors (98), producer/processors (397) and retailers (236) will be interested in participating and building relationships with the event attendees.

- · Create new "cannabis consumption event organizer license" in the system.
- · Licensing would need to develop the application process for a new license type.
- · Licensing would need to develop or contract the training program and continual requirements for a budtender program.
- · Licensing would need to review and approve any events submitted to include an operating/floor plan review and considerations of cross-tier involvement of other licensees.
- · A third-party contractor would need to review and establish eligibility requirements for social equity applicants for applying for any license revoked, cancelled, or forfeited through July 1, 2032.
  - · Licensing would need to respond to any adverse input on annual renewals.
- · Licensing would need to develop and maintain requirements for review of products, packaging, and labeling of products intended for one-time use sale at events.
  - · Requires the event organizer to have a temporary on-site consumption event permit issued by the board in advance of

each event which includes event details. For each event, Licensing Specialist Senior would need to review, not limited to, a list of participating cannabis businesses participating, a diagram of the event premises, demonstration of required local permit or approval, security plan, plan to deter customers from driving under the influence, and procedures for disposal of abandoned cannabis products. With potentially 500 licenses, based off a percentage of cannabis retailer experience, with 12 events permitted, anticipate 6,000 events per year.

- · Event fee for a licensee who obtained a license through the cannabis social equity program is waived through July 1, 2032.
- · The bill would require staff to determine, provide, and maintain a list of approved products allowed at an onsite consumption event.

#### ENFORCEMENT DIVISION:

The Washington State Liquor and Cannabis Board ("Board") keeps detailed statistics on all of its enforcement activities and tracks this activity using a unit of measure called a Field Increment (FI). All direct enforcement activities such as premise checks, inspections and investigations are tracked to determine how many FI's are needed to accomplish each activity. Each FI is equivalent to 1/10th of an hour (6 minutes). For example, if a tavern premise check takes 2 FI's and two officers, it is anticipated that one check will consume 4 FI's. Using historical data to factor out indirect activities such as driving time, training, office time and leave, it has been determined that officers are available for an average of 4,220 FI's each year.

The agency anticipates a workload impact from this legislation to occur from licensee education, complaint investigations, premise checks, undercover operations, and notices to correct. Please see the attached "1932 HB Cannabis consumption - Enforcement Field Increment Calculator.pdf" for the workload calculations.

This bill adds new sections to 69.50 RCW to authorize cannabis consumption in regulated environments by creating a new type of cannabis license called a "cannabis consumption event organizer" license.

Section 2.5.m requires cannabis consumption event organizer licensees to post conspicuous notices at the point of sale with the same information about high potency cannabis required to be posted by cannabis retailers under RCW 69.50.357(5), which the Department of Health (DOH) must make available to cannabis consumption event organizer licensees as well as licensed cannabis producers, processors, or retailers participating in consumption events (section 13.5.b).

Section 3.1.b requires the Liquor and Cannabis Board (LCB) to consult with DOH to ensure the curriculum of the budtender training program, which is to be developed and provided by the Board, does not include topics related to health or medical issues that are addressed in a training or education program leading to a medical cannabis consultant certificate established under RCW 69.51A.290.

DOH already has the required signage developed and accessible on the LCB website which are available free of charge to licensed cannabis retailers. This section would require no new or additional work from DOH and has no fiscal impact.

#### Narrative Explanation (Required for Indeterminate Cash Receipts)

Section 2(1) creates a new cannabis consumption event organizer license which authorizes the holder to organize and conduct consumption events at specified locations specified dates and times approved by the board at which adults age 21 and over may purchase single-use cannabis products and ready-to-consume cannabis products. The application fee is \$500. Annual license renewal is \$200.

The agency estimates 500 new cannabis consumption event organizer licenses.

Application fee (assumes all in FY26) -  $$500 \times 500 = $250,000$ 

Annual fee - \$200 x 500 = \$100,000 per year.

Section 2(5) The licensee must have a temporary on-site consumption event permit issued by the board in advance of each consumption event. The board may by rule establish the fee for a temporary on-site consumption event permit under this subsection, provided the fee may not exceed \$500 per event. The event fee under this subsection (5)(a) for a licensee who obtained a license through the cannabis social equity program is waived through July 1, 2032.

The board must establish the elements of a budtender permit program, including permit fees, by rule.
